



CHARACTERISATION OF WOMEN IN 150 INITIAL NIPS





Climate Change Gender Action Plans (ccGAPs)

IUCN's ccGAP methodology has been employed 23 times to date, across numerous countries and regions.



*Mozambique applied the ccGAP process twice: it was the first country to adopt a ccGAP in 2010 and updated it in 2014.






The IUCN-conducted survey demonstrates that gender-based violence is observed in at least 59% of projects related to the work of survey respondents. Despite its prevalence, 46% of respondents also noted that gender-based violence is not considered a priority in their office or programme.




