



**Twenty-fourth meeting of the Executive Committee of the Warsaw International Mechanism for
Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts**

14 – 18 September 2026, Majuro, Republic of the Marshall Islands

Background paper by the Co-Chairs for item 6(a) – (f)¹

I. Context

1. ExCom 17 (September 2022) adopted its second five-year rolling workplan (2023–2027) that contains 16 activities across five strategic workstreams (slow onset events, non-economic losses, comprehensive risk management, human mobility, and action and support) and 20 cross-cutting activities.
2. In developing the workplan, the ExCom took into account the plans of action of its five thematic expert groups to avoid duplicative activities and to facilitate overall synergies across the workstreams.
3. The workplan also contains a placeholder for follow-up activities to be included in response to guidance by the governing body or bodies. This placeholder enables the ExCom to respond to the evolving needs and concerns of developing countries vulnerable to the impacts of climate change and keep its activities compatible and current amid the progress in overall support architecture for loss and damage.
4. The table below provides an overview of the current status of the activities contained in the workplan and the linkages across activities (within ExCom’s workplan and across plans of action of thematic expert groups).

II. Next steps

5. Noting the above, the ExCom may wish to consider the implementation status of activities of the workplan, and agree on the next steps accordingly, where appropriate, including by:
 - (a) Identifying which activities warrant a decision at ExCom 25 to achieve desired impacts in a timely manner;
 - (b) Prioritizing the consideration of those activities;
 - (c) Observing linkages across activities and agenda items;
 - (d) Any needed adjustments to respond to emerging needs and evolving contexts;
 - (e) Providing guidance to its thematic expert groups, where appropriate.

SNAB and ExCom held a structured dialogue on 16 June 2026 to discuss the draft terms of reference of the report on loss and damage. At SB 64, ExCom jointly organized a dialogue on the work of constituted bodies relating to adaptation and loss and damage with LEG, AC, and the FWG of the LCIPP to present ongoing work and areas of support relevant to adaptation and loss and damage.
