# Twentieth meeting of the Executive Committee of the Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts, Bonn, Germany

# 12-15 March 2024

Background document by the Co-chairs

# About this document

This document provides information on guidance from Parties to ExCom from CMA 5 /COP 28 and offers possible approaches to respond to them. ExCom will be invited to consider the possible approaches and agree on any action as needed.

- 1. As part of the outcomes of the Dubai Climate Change Conference (November–December 2023), the Parties, through decision 7/CMA.5¹ on the Report of the Executive Committee of the Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage (ExCom), provided guidance on a range of ExCom's activities. Further, decision 1/CMA.5, the first global stocktake includes a new request for action by ExCom.
- 2. Table 1 below provides relevant excerpts from decisions 7/CMA.5, 1/CP.28 and 5/CMA.5 that are directed at ExCom, and suggestions for possible approaches for each provision.
- 3. Table 2 below provides relevant excerpts from COP 28/CMA 5 decisions that are generic to constituted bodies, and suggestions for possible approaches for each provision.

#### Decisions 11/CP.28 & decision 15/CMA.5: Annual technical progress report of the Paris Committee on Capacity-building for 2023

Para 2/2 *Invites* Parties, as appropriate, the operating entities of the Financial Mechanism, the **constituted bodies** under the Convention/the Paris Agreement, United Nations organizations, observers and other stakeholders to consider the recommendations referred to in paragraph 1 above<sup>4</sup> and to take any necessary action, as appropriate and in accordance with their mandates.

## Decisions 16/CP.28 and decision 21/CMA.5: Presidency youth climate champion

Para Encourage the Chairs of the subsidiary bodies and the Chairs of the UNFCCC constituted

11/11 bodies to invite the Presidency youth climate champion, whose role is to facilitate the
meaningful engagement of children and youth in climate action, including within the UNFCCC
process, to attend the sessions and meetings of those bodies, as appropriate.

Linkages with Activity #11. UNFCCC Youth and children NGO (YOUNGO) constituency group is invited to all regular meetings of ExCom as observers. YOUNGO has membership seat in the NELs expert group and the Task Force on Displacement.

In addition to continuing the above approaches, ExCom may wish to consider inviting the Presidency youth climate champion to future meetings

## Decision 15/CP.28: Gender and climate change

Para 2 *Invites* Parties, United Nations entities, the UNFCCC **constituted bodies** and relevant organizations, in accordance with their respective mandates and priorities, to submit via the submission portal by 31 March 2024 their inputs on progress, challenges, gaps and priorities in implementing the gender action plan, categorized by deliverable or output for each activity under the gender action plan, and on future work to be undertaken on gender and climate change, with a view to the submissions informing the review referred to in paragraph 1 above.<sup>5</sup>

ExCom may wish to consider whether to make a submission and if so, exchange views on scope of the input, and schedule a parallel breakout session to draft the submission for endorsement by ExCom before the closing of ExCom 20 (given the deadline for submission)

<sup>- 8.</sup> Decides to continue and strengthen the Sharm el-Sheikh dialogue between Parties, relevant organizations and stakeholders to exchange views on and enhance understanding of the scope of Article 2, paragraph 1(c), of the Paris Agreement and its complementarity with Article 9 of the Paris Agreement referred to in decision 1/CMA.4, paragraph 68, including with regard to the operationalization and implementation of Article 2, paragraph 1(c), in 2024 and 2025, recognizing the significant scale of investment needed to keep the global average temperature rise to well below 2 °C above pre-industrial levels and to pursue efforts to limit the temperature increase to 1.5 °C above pre-industrial levels, and to adapt to the adverse impacts of climate change and foster climate-resilient and low greenhouse gas emission development, including in the context of sustainable development and efforts to eradicate poverty;
