







## High-level Opening of the Youth-Affiliated Event and Intergenerational Dialogue

## I. Background

As intergenerational equity was acknowledged in the Paris Agreement in 2015, youth around the world and specifically from the Latin American and the Caribbean Region have been actively engaged in climate action considering the diversity and particular needs from each vulnerable community. At COP 26, the Glasgow work programme on ACE acknowledged the growing interest of youth in climate action and stated the critical role of youth and children as agents of change. Therefore, Parties called for further enhancement of youth participation in climate change processes though the adoption of the Action Plan for the Glasgow work programme on ACE at COP 27 (particularly Activity C.2, Priority Area Tools and Support) which highlights the need to meaningfully include youth in and engage with them on climate action at all levels and facilitate the inclusive participation of, inter alia, children, women, indigenous peoples and persons with disabilities, in climate action.

## II. Description and Objectives

The Youth-Affiliated event at the Latin America and the Caribbean Climate Week, supported by the <u>Youth4Capacity</u> programme, the <u>ACE Hub</u>, YOUNGO, and COP28 is being organized with the aim to create a platform for youth to get together and discuss opportunities to enhance meaningful youth engagement and participation in climate policymaking and action in the Latin America and the Caribbean region through various events.

The youth-affiliated event will be delivered in various segments over 2 days (24 and 25 October) in Panama. For further information, please refer to the webpage <a href="here">here</a>.

The aim of the High Level opening is to build momentum for the sessions throughout the two days, where children, youth, UN agencies and government representatives will address the existing needs and solutions of the Latin American and the Caribbean region. The opening will also be an opportunity to introduce the intergenerational dialogue that will follow where the results of the survey assessment led by YOUNGO will be presented, identifying the gaps in children and youth climate engagement in Latin America and the Caribbean. Assessing the takeaways from the survey will allow better engagement of youth and children in decision-making processes, encouraging active participation, and fostering a sense of ownership over climate-related projects and policies.
