MPGCA Water Action Event: The power of water: the unexplored potential for climate resilience

Description	The event will showcase recent signals of change in water for climate across the globe. It will demonstrate tangible water solutions to inspire more ambitious water action. The aim is to offer a cross-sectoral perspective that moves beyond thematic silos by including non-traditional water voices and the potential for non-state actors to broaden and deepen engagement globally. Also, the aim is to build a business case for water. The event will showcase opportunities for
	accessing finance flows for water and climate related implementations. The event will include the launch of initiatives aiming to bolster resilience, boost nature-based solutions funding and calling for more actions from non-state actors.
Headline	Climate insecurity is water insecurity: By way of holistic and inclusive action we can tap into the true potential of water as the solution to climate change.
Outcomes	 Thinking about the Cross Sectors - multi-stakeholder engagement/collaboration is important because water is cross sectoral Stocktake of progress opportunities in scaling up NbS and how to strengthen collaboration. Non-state actors call for national and regional representatives to take more ambitious and inclusive water action. By highlighting the solutions within the water community, we offer the opportunity to reflect this ambition in NDCs. Closing finance gap for water: the potential of private and public finance for water solutions realised, current barriers to a significant increase in funding and examples of how they have been solved, with the focus on the Global South.
Objectives	COP27 is implementation focused. This water action event will showcase successful implementation, talk about the challenges, how to unlock finance and the importance of working together across sectors. As part of this event, we intend to showcase work being done in several key areas that align with the Water Action Pathway. In particular: - Protecting people - Protecting and restoring water resources and ecosystems The emphasis will be on collaboration and cross sectoral actions and the link to economic prosperity and development. Key points to discuss will be the importance of data sharing and cooperation across various industries. The projects which will be showcased align with the water action pathway and will demonstrate progress, highlighting how various voices have been incorporated and areas of improvement. The event will hear from individuals working in water and in other sectors.



	The second panel will bring voices from banks and corporations who can speak about the role that banks and companies can play in advancing the water action pathway and what they have done so far in the water space. This panel will provide insights on how collaborations have been successful and what is needed to scale up finance.
*Participants	 Local actors, marginalised voices, and underrepresented groups (indigenous people, women, youth and global south perspective) - often the first to experience the effects of climate change but seldom promoted in decision-making. NGOs - advocacy work and frameworks with a direct impact on water for climate Governments - representatives leading the integration of water in their climate change policies. Academics and research institutions - Bringing the scientific urgency to act now. Also, establishing the need to think holistically and to incorporate the interlinkages between water, food security and climate change. Civil society - who is advocating for climate action across sectors Private sector - including corporations with water/climate impact
Key messages	 This entire event is to both help shape a common narrative that weaves together the current and future initiatives and commitments toward the common goal post UN 2023 Water Conference. Will show advancements made in financing and collaborations for water for climate actions. Key messages: Climate insecurity is water insecurity Water can contribute to climate mitigation and adaptation efforts and successful stories show it is possible. Non-state actors play an essential role in maximising ambition. Cross sector action with a holistic approach is necessary to break silos for water and climate Nature-based solutions need to be scaled up. Opportunities for accessing finance flows for water and climate related implementations need to be increased and long-lasting.

INITIATIVE SPOTLIGHT – TNC, Nature 4 water facility

Brief description of initiative:

This initiative is a collaboration between The Nature Conservancy and Pegasys – provides technical assistance to local clients developing watershed investment programs that employ Nature-based Solutions (NbS) for water security, biodiversity, climate, and livelihood outcomes. The initiative aims to execute 40+ watershed investment programs and will open-source its tools and learnings to scale NbS within the broader water sector.

Launching and signing the Fair Water Footprint Declaration at COP26 was a breakthrough moment for the water and climate agenda and action. It plays a unique role by bringing together governments from the global north and south which trade thirsty and polluting commodities, along with financiers, corporations, and civil society to put resilient and equitable water management at the heart of the global economy. The Declaration targets the five SDG 6 aligned outcomes of: zero pollution, sustainable withdrawal, universal WASH, promotion of nature and effective drought and flood management by 2030.
