

Fourth Retreat of the Climate Resilient Food Systems (CRFS) Alliance

Marlborough House, London

3-4 April 2025

1. Introduction:

The Fourth Retreat of the Climate Resilient Food Systems (CRFS) Alliance was convened from 3 to 4 April 2025. Hosted by the Commonwealth Secretariat, at Marlborough House in London, the retreat had participation from a diverse group of partners across climate, food systems, water, finance, and resilience domains. The retreat served as a strategic opportunity to take stock of 2024 activities, reflect on structural changes in the Alliance, and define key activities for 2025. It brought forward themes of collaboration, policy and support, finance, country diagnostics, and institutional coordination to accelerate food systems transformation. The CRFS Alliance retreat started with a keynote address by Dr. Ruth Kattumuri, Senior Director of the Economic, Youth and Sustainable Development Directorate at the Commonwealth Secretariat. She acknowledged the importance of food systems in both mitigation and adaptation to climate. She challenged the Alliance to continue to innovate, collaborate and renew commitment to act and support the ambitious transformation of our global food system.

- **2. Strategic Activities and Deliverables in 2024:** The retreat started with a review of activities carried out by the CRFS Alliance in 2024, covering country diagnostics, workshops, webinars, policy briefs, advocacy and the Partnership on Water Resilient Food Systems.
- **2.1 Country Diagnostics:** The CRFS Alliance's country diagnostics aim to align food and climate policies, identify transformation bottlenecks and opportunities, support resource mobilization and investment, and inform national planning and partner engagement. Diagnostics were a cornerstone of 2024's work and highlighted the need to bridge fragmented planning across agriculture, DRR, and climate. So far eight diagnostics have been executed, and reports have been published for Bangladesh, Ethiopia, Belize, Fiji, Pakistan, Panama, Lesotho and The Gambia.
- **2.2 Capacity-Building Workshops:** In collaboration with the Commonwealth Secretariat, the CRFS Alliance hosted its first food and climate workshop in Lesotho (October 2024). This workshop focused on responding to priority gaps identified in Lesotho diagnostic and emphasized cross-ministerial collaboration. The result was the ThabaBosiu Food Systems Declaration, which includes actions such as farmer capacity building, conservation agriculture, infrastructure upgrades, behaviour change for sustainability, and finance mobilization. The Declaration was endorsed by national leadership and continues to inform national policies and implementation.
- **2.3 Webinars:** The Alliance conducted webinars on innovation and technology, private sector engagement, and the water-energy-food nexus, each attracting 40–60 participants from various organizations. Two additional webinars are planned for 2025 to build on this momentum.
- **2.4 Policy Briefs:** Short policy briefs were developed in 2024 to align members and advocate for shared priorities. Topics included comprehensive risk management (CRM) and integrated programming under the Rio Conventions. These briefs targeted both internal stakeholders and external audiences such as donors and country partners.
- **2.5 Partnerships and Advocacy:** Advocacy has remained central to the CRFS Alliance. In 2024, the Alliance launched its third Advocacy Framework, supporting partners in aligning messaging at major global events. Collaboration with FAST, FAO, and World Bank has expanded the Alliance's influence on finance, resilience, and regional cooperation.



- **2.6 Water-Resilient Food Systems (WRFS):** Launched at COP28, the WRFS partnership advanced through a framing retreat and consultations during COP29. A framing document is being finalized by IWMI and FAO. Though in early stages, the initiative aims to elevate water resilience in food systems policy.
- <u>3. Strategic Priorities and Activities for 2025:</u> Activities to prioritize during 2025 were outlined. These include regional food and climate labs, Rio Convention integrated programme pilot, country diagnostic lessons learnt, and support for implementing food systems related priorities in naps.
- **3.1 Regional Labs on Climate-Food-Water Integration:** The Regional Labs, co-led by the CRFS Alliance and FAST (Food and Agriculture for Sustainable Transformation) Partnership, respond to strong country demand. Held in priority regions, these immersive multi-day sessions will support climate-resilient food systems through tailored learning and planning. They will convene officials from key ministries, donors, private sector, and experts to explore regenerative agriculture, the water-food-climate nexus, climate finance, innovation, and alignment with global frameworks.
- **3.2 Rio Conventions Food Systems Integrated Program Pilot:**_The Rio Conventions Food Systems Integrated Programme Pilot is a joint initiative by the UNFCCC, UNCCD, and CBD to address the interconnected challenges of climate change, biodiversity loss, and land degradation through integrated food systems policy. The pilot will be implemented in Ethiopia, Brazil, Vietnam, and possibly Somalia, chosen for regional diversity and strong national engagement with the conventions. The programme aims to identify policy gaps and opportunities through joint assessments, followed by multi-stakeholder consultations involving national focal points and ministries. Each country will produce a concise 5–10-page report, which will inform a broader Global Call to Action to be launched ahead of COP30 in Brazil. The initiative involves collaboration with UNFCCC, CBD, UNCCCD, FAO, CGIAR, FAST, UNDRR, and others, with funding discussions underway.
- **3.3 Country Diagnostics Reports Lessons Learnt:** In 2025, two new country diagnostics are underway for Brazil and Somalia. Reports on these will be finalized and added to the existing set. Alongside this, a cross-country lesson learnt exercise will review diagnostics from ten countries to identify shared priorities and challenges.
- **3.4 Support for implementing Food Systems related Priorities in NAPs**: Food systems feature prominently in National Adaptation Plans (NAPs), with strong linkages to the other thematic targets of the Global Goal on Adaptation (GGA) such as water, health, and ecosystems. As a cross-cutting sector, food systems offer high-impact adaptation opportunities, especially in vulnerable contexts like LDCs and SIDS. identifying opportunities to assist countries in implementing food systems related priorities of their NAPs will be essential.
- **3.5 Webinars:** Building on the webinars held in 2024, two additional webinars are planned for 2025. The topics for these will be developed by the UNFCCC Secretariat and shared to all members.
- 4. Fundraising: A key focus of the retreat was on fundraising. Participants reflected on how their respective institutions could support upcoming activities of the Alliance, and to brainstorm on potential new donors. Potential funders discussed included foundations (such as Mastercard, Post Lottery, Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, Bezos Foundation, Ikea Foundation, Rockefeller Foundation), and multilateral funds (for example the Global Environment Facility) and bilateral donors (such as Switzerland, the Netherlands, Ireland, France, Germany, the EU, UAE, Saudi Arabia, and Japan). Members present at the meeting agreed to explore the possibility of a joint fundraising letter for selected activities cosigned by different members of the alliance. UNDRR and FAO emphasized the opportunity for the Alliance to join the Santiago Network, which provides technical assistance funding to countries for averting, minimizing, and addressing loss and damage.
- **4.1 Rio Convention Integrated Programme**: Food and Agriculture for Sustainable Transformation (FAST) highlighted an ongoing collaboration with the Consultative Group on International Agricultural Research (CGIAR), offering USD 20,000 in funding and staff support which can potentially align with Alliance activities. Furthermore,



an invitation was extended for CRFS representatives to present at FAST's June board meeting in Bonn to strengthen alignment and visibility among donor members

- **4.2 Country Diagnostics:** are core internal tools for the Alliance but can also help countries engage partners and shape funding strategies, in future diagnostics their intended use and purpose should be clarified at the beginning of the document and if possible, a more "farmer-centric" perspective should be included. FAO expressed the willingness to lead the Diagnostic for Somalia.
- **4.3 Funding for Regional Labs:** After the retreat a dedicated meeting, be held with World Bank, UNEP, Crop Trust, Commonwealth Secretariat and FAST to explore funding and capacity opportunities for the Regional Climate and Food Labs.
- **4.4 Strengthen Secretariat Capacity:** Additional support is needed to maintain coordination and keep Alliance operations running effectively. FAST offered to coordinate the alliance which was welcomed by the members present. It was agreed that the UNFCCC will engage with FAST on progressing this after the meeting.

5. Major Milestones and plans for engagement:

- **5.1 COP30:** COP30 will take place in November 2025 in Belém, Brazil, with agrifood system resilience likely to feature, though the presidency's agenda is still evolving. Themes such as deforestation, land restoration, and biodiversity may become central. The CRFS Alliance plans to host one or two high-level events to present key deliverables, including regional labs, diagnostics, and the Rio Conventions Pilot.
- **5.2 UNFSS+4:** The United Nations Food Systems Summit Stocktake (UNFSS+4) will take place from 27–29 July 2025 in Ethiopia, co-hosted by Italy. With a shorter agenda than UNFSS+2, the event will focus on country-led progress in food systems transformation, accountability, and investment. Coalitions are encouraged to collaborate on joint thematic sessions, particularly around resilience and convergence, rather than organizing stand-alone events. To ensure meaningful engagement, the Alliance should focus on strategic visibility, avoid fragmented activities, and coordinate closely with partners like FAST and the HDP Nexus Coalition.

6. Action points ensuing from the retreat are as follows:

- Regional Labs: A dedicated meeting to be held with members who expressed a strong interest in the Regional Labs (UNEP, WB, Crop Trust, Commonwealth, FAST).
- Rio Convention Pilot: CRFS Alliance will continue coordination across FAST and UNDRR.
- <u>Country Diagnostics</u>: FAO will lead the development for Somalia, whilst UNFCCC will continue the
 development of the Country Diagnostics for Brazil. A clear framing of purpose and intended audience will
 be added in the initial chapter of the diagnostics. A lessons learnt exercise is intended to be carried out
 across the ten diagnostics, subject to capacity.
- Overall CRFS Alliance coordination: A dedicated meeting will be held with FAO/FAST to define coordination next steps
- <u>Mapping of Activities</u>: CRFS Alliance members will be required to review the mapping of activities (Annex II) and provide input in case they haven't done so already.
- <u>Joint Fundraising</u>: Possibilities for a joint fundraising note will be explored for selected activities.
- Santiago Network: Possibilities for the CRFS Alliance to join the Santiago Network will be explored.
