Discussion Group 1: Strengthening action under the UNFCCC

This must be done based on the best available science, recognizing that the ocean must be considered in all aspects of climate change action.

Discussion Group 2: Strengthening action across the UN

This discussion group will explore options and opportunities for strengthening understanding of, and synergies between, UNFCCC and the wider UN system's support for action on ocean and climate change.
