# Adaptation Fund at a glance

Established in 2001 and operationalized in 2007 under the Kyoto Protocol & since 2019 serving the Paris Agreement

Over US\$ 1.2 billion allocated to 155 concrete adaptation projects with tangible results at the local level that can be scaled up

Pioneered Direct Access modality with majority of Implementing Entities being NIEs

All developing countries that are Parties to the KP or PA are eligible to access funding

# Medium-Term Strategy from 2023 to 2027: Mandate – Mission – Strategic Priorities

## MANDATE

**Finance concrete adaptation projects and programmes that are country driven** and based on the needs, views and priorities of developing country Parties that are particularly vulnerable to the adverse effects of climate change in meeting the cost of adaptation

## MISSION

The Adaptation Fund serves the Paris Agreement by **accelerating effective adaptation action and efficient access to finance, including through direct access**, to respond to the urgent needs and priorities of developing countries. The Fund does so by supporting country-driven adaptation projects and programmes, innovation, and learning with concrete results at the local level that can be scaled up.

# Support for NAPs & NDC Implementation

Kickstarting NAPs implementation through simplified access to grant funding for concrete, localized, and effective adaptation that can be scaled up

**The Fund pays particular attention to NAPs & NDCs in its programming processes**

According to Fund's [Operational Policies and Guidelines \(OPGs\)](#):

- Projects should be developed in way to take into account NAPs & NDCs, if they exist
- Board shall give particular attention to consistency with NAPs etc. in assessing proposals
- All proposals are screened for consistency with NAPs & NDCs, if they exist

**Countries can choose their priority sectors/themes in line with their NAPs & NDCs can accredit relevant NIEs**

- Countries are encouraged to make use of the direct access modality, where possible, and accredit NIEs that have capacities to implement projects in priority sectors
- Countries can make strategic choices about the use of AF resources for their priority sectors

**Support for learning, innovation and scaling up to support**

- Identify and prioritize effective adaptation solutions for inclusion in NAPs & NDCs and wider implementation
- Encourage the testing of new and emerging adaptation solutions for inclusion in NAPs & NDCs
- Scaling up of successful adaptation projects with other funders

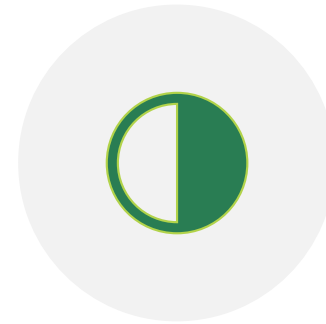

Increase of Project Formualtion Grants to US\$ 150,000 max. & additional PFG for LLA of up to US\$ 100,000

# Project Formulation Grants per project/programme

Inclusive of IE fee, capped at 8.5%

## Single Country projects under all funding windows (regular, large innovation and [EDA/LLA])

- For single country projects **below US\$ 2 million** the limit is set at US\$ 50,000;
- For single country projects **US\$ 2 million and above but below US\$ 5 million** the limit is set at US\$ 100,000;
- For single country projects **US\$ 5 million and above**, the limit is set at US\$ 150,000;

## Additional PFG for [LLA] projects

- For single country [LLA] projects, additional PFG amount up to a maximum of US\$ 100,000 and will be evaluated on a case-by-case basis as per the provided justifications to support activities that enable devolving decision making to local actors & to enable local actors to make informed decisions on how adaptation actions are defined, prioritized, designed and implemented.

## Regional projects under all funding windows

- For all regional projects of **US\$ 5 million and above with less than three countries**, the limit is set at US\$ 150,000.
- The limit can increase by **US\$ 15,000 for each additional country involved**, up to a maximum of US\$ 250,000.

## PFG for projects submitted using three-step approach

- When a 3-step approach is used, the maximum amount of PFG that can be requested at the pre-concept stage is twenty percent (20%) of the maximum total PFG applicable to the project.

Requests for a PFG should be made at the same time as the submission of a project concept or pre-concept to the secretariat using the revised PFG form in Annex I of document AFB/PPRC.33/40.

# Activities that are eligible for Project Formulation Grants

Local consultations, and/or workshops to discuss the specific project and program ideas (including translation into local languages, preparation of background papers, etc).

Travel costs for experts, when required, for consultations and discussions with interested parties and stakeholders, and local participation as needed in project design.

Country-, region-, or site-specific risk assessments, including identifying hazards, vulnerabilities, development of scenarios and determining hazard mitigation options.

Consultancies and contracts to develop program and/or project options.

Gender and Environmental and Social risk analyses and formulation of Environmental and Social Management Plan and Gender Action Plan.

Free prior and informed consent and related consultations where appropriate to ensure compliance with the Environmental and Social Policy.

Specific analyses in support of the proposed projects (policy analysis, data inventories and analyses, cost effectiveness, etc).

Identification of project or programme indicators and development of monitoring and evaluation plan.

Costs of translating documents into and out of English.

Assessing capacity of executing partners.

Enabling activities that support devolving the decision making regarding the project design to the lowest appropriate level.

# AF Designated Authorities / Focal Points

Responsible for the endorsement on behalf of the national government of:

- a) **Accreditation applications of up to two National Implementing Entities (NIEs)** submitted by national entities;
  - b) **Accreditation applications as Regional Implementing Entities (RIEs)** submitted by regional or sub-regional entities; and
  - c) **Projects and programmes proposed by the implementing entities**, either national, regional, subregional, or multilateral.
- The Designated Authority shall confirm **that the endorsed project/programme proposal is in accordance with the government's national or regional priorities in implementing adaptation activities**
- This includes whether the project is aligned with the country's national adaptation planning processes, including NAPs!**

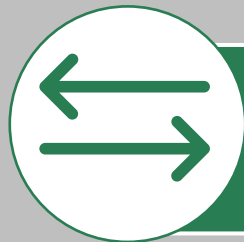
# Accreditation



**56 IEs accredited to date:** 32 NIEs, 9 RIEs, and 15 MIEs  
(10 NIEs in LDCs & 7 NIEs in SIDS)



**Streamlined accreditation** available for smaller entities



**Fast-track (re) accreditation** available for GCF Accredited Entities

The AF encourages countries to make use of the **Direct Access Modality**, promotes country ownership and builds national capacities

# Available readiness & capacity-building support

## Pre-accreditation

# New & Simplified Proposal Submission Process



Implementing Entities (IEs) are invited to submit project proposals and concepts **on a rolling basis** for all funding windows



To submit a proposal, the IE should submit to the AFB secretariat the relevant **proposal template & a valid Letter of Endorsement** signed by the DA, with the DA copied



AFB secretariat will deliver a **first technical review within 3 weeks** of receiving a proposal, except during the “review intermission” period (shortly before and during the Board meeting) & **IEs have up to 3 weeks to resubmit a revised proposal** after having received the technical review



The **AF Board considers proposals and concepts** that are technically cleared during its biannual Board meetings in March/April & October of each year.

- **Direct innovation funding to non- accredited entities** – indigenous people's groups, civil society organizations, associations, institutions, businesses, agencies, NGOs, women, youth and other vulnerable groups.

### Floating Farms, grant administered by UNDP

- Run by the **South Asian nature Forum for Environment (SAFE)**
- **12 local villages** and **2,200 households**
- **Hydroponic technology** to grow a variety of **seasonal crops** in grow bags, fed by **solar power** and a **small irrigation unit** which **removes saltwater** from the process
- **Designed to work alongside fish and crab farming** and **support the restoration of embankments** in flooded area
- **Farmers can make the floats themselves** which are **multi-purpose**
