## Draft conclusions proposed by the Chair

- 1. The SBI welcomed the information on progress in the implementation of the Poznan strategic programme on technology transfer contained in the reports of the GEF to COP 26.1 It also welcomed the continued support provided by the GEF for technology development and transfer, namely the approval by the GEF Council of proposed projects with technology transfer elements for climate change mitigation and adaptation during the GEF reporting period.
- 2. The SBI invited the Advisory Board of the Climate Technology Centre and Network to consider experience and lessons learned from the implementation of GEF projects for regional climate technology transfer and financing centres in preparing its next programme of work.
- 3. The SBI welcomed the efforts by the GEF to include in the fourth phase of the global project on technology needs assessments (TNAs) those least developed countries and small island developing States that have never undertaken a TNA.
- 4. The SBI invited the GEF to provide information in its report to COP 27 (November 2022) on its plans to provide support to all developing countries to regularly conduct and update their TNAs.
- 5. The SBI welcomed the actions undertaken by the TEC and the CTCN in response to the relevant recommendations contained in the TEC report on the updated evaluation of the Poznan strategic programme on technology transfer.<sup>2</sup> It encouraged the CTCN to continue to engage with multilateral development banks hosting the regional climate technology transfer and financing centres and exchange information on project pipelines to facilitate upscaling of technologies.
- 6. The SBI welcomed the fourth synthesis of technology needs identified by non-Annex I Parties,<sup>3</sup> including the completion of TNAs by 53 non-Annex I Parties. It noted the financial support provided by the GEF for TNAs and the technical support provided by the United Nations Environment Programme and regional organizations for TNAs.
- 7. The SBI also noted that the most commonly reported categories of barrier to the development and transfer of prioritized technologies were economic and financial barriers.<sup>4</sup> The SBI invited Parties, the TEC, the CTCN and relevant organizations in a position to do so to support developing countries in overcoming these barriers, including by enhancing linkages between technology action plans and support providers.
- 8. The SBI acknowledged the interlinkages between TNAs and other national climateand development-related processes and encouraged Parties to take those interlinkages into account when preparing nationally determined contributions and national adaptation plans.
- 9. The SBI requested the secretariat to prepare an updated synthesis report on TNAs and technology action plans, including those in relation to countries in phases III–IV of the global TNA project, for consideration at SBI 61 (November 2024).
