Background and Objective

As the global climate agenda enters a decisive implementation phase, attention is increasingly shifting from commitments and targets toward how climate action is delivered in practice and translated into tangible benefits for people and communities. At the same time, growing urbanization and increasing climate impacts are reinforcing the central role of cities in delivering solutions that advance both climate and sustainable development.

Healthy urban environments are increasingly recognized as a key outcome of effective climate action. Measures such as improving air quality, expanding green and blue infrastructure, promoting active mobility, strengthening resilient health systems and NOR considerations into urban climate policies therefore offers an opportunity to maximize social, environmental and economic co-benefits. Similarly, post-crisis reconstruction presents a unique opportunity to embed climate resilience into the recovery process by rebuilding cities and communities through integrated planning, resilient infrastructure, low-carbon construction, nature-based solutions and inclusive public services.

Achieving the objectives of the Paris Agreement, the New Urban Agenda and the Sustainable Development Goals depends increasingly on placing cities at the centre of climate action and strengthening connections between climate and urban action.

Recent milestones, including COP 29, COP 30, UNFCCC Climate Week 3, and the Thirteenth Session of the World Urban Forum (WUF13), have reinforced the importance of multilevel governance, local delivery and partnerships that enable successful solutions to move from individual projects to systemic implementation at scale. Looking ahead, the IPCC Special Report on Cities, expected in early 2027, represents a further important milestone for the global climate and urban agenda.

Recognizing the need to sustain this momentum beyond individual conferences and strengthen continuity between global climate and urban processes, Azerbaijan launched the Baku Continuity Coalition (BCC) for Urban Climate Action during COP29. Further advanced through COP30 and WUF13, the Coalition serves as a platform to address a key governance gap by maintaining alignment across successive COP and WUF processes, promoting policy coherence, facilitating knowledge exchange and strengthening partnerships among all stakeholders. By connecting global dialogue with implementation, it supports coordinated action across sectors and levels of governance, helping translate international commitments into tangible urban outcomes.

This comes at a time when the COP 31 Presidency has placed implementation at the centre of its Global Climate Action Agenda and identified resilient cities, health, food security, youth and education, and zero waste among its priority themes. Cities and regions sit at the convergence of these priorities. Many of the most urgent climate challenges, including extreme heat, flooding, public health risks, food insecurity, and increasing waste generation and growing infrastructure pressures, are experienced most acutely at the local level. As a result, some of the most effective climate interventions are those that deliver multiple benefits simultaneously: reducing emissions, strengthening resilience, improving public health, protecting vulnerable communities, and supporting sustainable urban development as recognized in the Belém Health Action Plan, the framework for climate and health adaptation launched at COP 30. These integrated approaches are equally relevant in post-crisis contexts, where rebuilding cities and communities offers an opportunity not only to recover from conflict or disasters but also to reduce future climate risks and build healthier, more resilient and inclusive urban environments.

Besides, climate implementation is also inherently spatial. National targets for adaptation, mitigation, resilience, health and resource efficiency are translated into results through decisions on land use, housing, buildings, transport, infrastructure, public space and basic services. Urban and territorial planning therefore provides an essential implementation framework for aligning sectoral climate measures, managing trade-offs, identifying vulnerable communities and directing public and private investment towards resilient and low-carbon development.

Realizing these opportunities requires not only political ambition but also stronger partnerships, greater policy coherence and sustained collaboration across stakeholders, as advocated for in the recent Baku Call to Action. In this regard, this Impact Dialogue at Baku Climate Week 4 will explore how stronger climate-urban partnerships can accelerate implementation by connecting global frameworks with practical action in cities and regions. The dialogue will examine both the partnerships needed to connect global commitments with local action and the practical solutions that can accelerate climate delivery ahead of COP 31.

- How will spatial planning and service coverage reduce unmanaged waste and methane emissions?
- How do national climate ambitions become spatial policy, funded urban programmes and accountable local delivery?
