



OBSERVER ENGAGEMENT

Scale and diversity characterize the UNFCCC observer landscape; no other UN annual conference attracts as many and diverse observers to its sessions as the UNFCCC.

UNFCCC is a Party-driven process – so why are observers important?



Form **public opinions** in support of countries combating climate change



Hold Parties **accountable** for what was agreed at the intergovernmental process



Share technical inputs, solutions and experiences on the ground for implementation.



Ensures **legitimacy**, **inclusion and transparency** of the UNFCCC process

OBSERVER ENGAGEMENT

What do observers do?



Prepare concrete textual proposals that reflects the on-going negotiations for bilateral meetings



Participate in mandated events and constituted bodies for in-depth discussions with Parties



Follow the negotiations and respond to calls for **submissions**



Join voices together and collaborate with other groups rather than working in isolation



Showcase findings and views at side events, exhibits, advocacy actions



Mitigation Imperative





Mitigation Work Programme



- ➤ In November 2021, by Decision 1/CMA.3, para. 27, Parties established a work programme to **urgently scale up mitigation ambition and implementation** in this critical decade in a manner that complements the global stocktake.
- ➤ In November 2022, by Decision 4/CMA.4, Parties agreed on the **Sharm el-Sheikh mitigation ambition** and implementation work programme
- > At SB 60: Joint SB agenda item to consider progress at each of their sessions
- ➤ In 2024:
 - Requested to organize two GD/IFEs on "Cities: Buildings and Urban Systems":
 - 3rd GD/IFE during the SB60 pre-sessional week (27-29 May 2024)
 - Summary Report to be published before GD4/IFE4
 - 4th GD/IFE in September/October 2024 (tentative intersessionally)
 - Summary report and Annual Report to be published before CMA6

Response Measures



- Impacts of implementation of response measures is understood under the Convention as the effects arising from the implementation of mitigation policies, programs, actions taken by Parties under the Convention, KP and the Paris Agreement
- ➤ Institutional arrangements supports this work:
 - Forum under subsidiary bodies reporting to COP/ CMP/ CMA through SB
 - Katowice committee on impacts (KCI) provides technical support to the forum
- > Areas of work
 - Just transition of workforce and creation of decent work and quality jobs
 - Economic diversification and transformation
 - Assessing and analysing the impacts of implementation of response measuers
 - Facilitating and building capacity on identification, development, customization and use of tools and methodologies to assess the impacts of the implementation of response measures

Article 6 of the Paris Agreement



- Article 6 of the Paris Agreement lays down the foundation for cooperative approaches among countries to achieve their nationally determined contributions (NDCs) to carbon reduction.
- Article 6 is an important part of the world's "toolbox" for addressing climate change
- Article 6 is the only part of the PA that directly engages the business and private investment sector
 in directly implementable activities in which they can invest
 - There is strong real-world potential for cooperative action shown by existing pilot
 Article 6 projects, with the UN decisions in Glasgow understanding the overall impact of cooperative action on global mitigation is facilitated
- Many similar tools are being increasingly deployed at domestic, regional, and bilateral levels...
- Centralized mechanism helps in ensuring broader accessibility of the market

Activities at SB 60



➤ Negotiations:

- Article 6.2 Further technical guidance on 18 issues of which key issues are Authorization (scope, content, format); International Registry infrastructure to track transaction and/or information; Agreed electronic format (AEF) that records quantitative information on Annual transactions.
- Article 6.4 Authorization (scope, content, format); Links between international Registry and mechanism registry; and expansion of scope of activity to cover avoidance beyond emission reductions and removals.
- Article 6.8 –Glasgow committee on Non-Market based Approaches NMA meetings and demo of the web based platform for NMA.

➤ Mandated Event (workshop on 6.8):

- o Fostering open exchange of information and articulating cooperation opportunities on specific NMA

The Principle 21 of the Rio Declaration identified nine sectors which includes Children and Youth


2009: Copenhagen Conference of Parties

















2005: Montreal Conference of Parties




The YOUNGO Constituency Bubble



SBs 60 Position Paper








For the first time, YOUNGO brings a position paper to the Subsidiary Bodies. This paper highlights the key demands from children and youth for the 60th Session of the Subsidiary Bodies: From Global Stocktake to NCQG, from Just Transition to Loss & Damage, from Glasgow Dialogue to Adaptation.

YOUNGO represents the voices of children and youth globally in the UNFCCC process by forming global positions through extensive consultation rounds with all the relevant stakeholders. We have backed up our demands with references from reliable sources, including the decisions made by Parties under the UNFCCC (COP, CMA..etc) or other IGOs/trade bodies within the United Nations space. With this Position Paper we are ensuring strong advocacy for climate justice in line with the technical agenda items.
