# SBI 48: Part I – Differentiated impacts of climate change and gender-responsive climate policy and action

## Annotations to the provisional programme

#### I. BACKGROUND

The Conference of Parties (COP) in its decision 21/CP.22, decided to continue and enhance the Lima work programme on gender, with a review of the work programme set for the twenty-fifth session of the COP (November 2019).<sup>1</sup> It also decided to hold an annual in-session workshop in 2018 and 2019. By decision 3/CP.23, the COP established a gender action plan and also decided that the topic for the 2018 workshop would be based on activity E.1 of that action plan.

Finally, the gender action plan invites Parties and observers oganizations to provide submissions on the topics set out in activity E.1.<sup>2</sup> The two topics that will be addressed in this first part of the workshop are information on:

- The differentiated impacts of climate change on women and men, with special attention paid to local communities and indigenous peoples.
- The integration of gender considerations into climate adaptation, mitigation, capacity-building, Action for Climate Empowerment, technology and finance policies, plans and actions

The second part of the workshop, to be held on Wednesday, 9 May from 11:00 – 14:00, will address the topic of the policies and plans for and progress made in enhancing gender balance in national climate delegations.

### II. OBJECTIVES AND ANTICIPATED OUTCOMES

The objectives of the in-session workshop are to:

- Raise awareness on the differentiated impacts of climate change, including how to identify such differences and address them in policy and action design and implementation.
- Build the capacity of participants to understand the tools and mechanisms that facilitate the design and implementation of gender-responsive climate policy and action.

The anticipated outcome is a summary report that captures challenges and good practices related to the topics of the workshop, which will be published as an information document after the close of SBI 48.

#### III. MODALITIES FOR THE IN-SESSION WORKSHOP

#### Format and duration

The in-session workshop may combine expert and technical presentations, smaller group discussions and panel presentations with sufficient time for substantive and interactive discussions on possible elements and activities under the gender action plan.

The first part of the in-session workshop is currently scheduled from 11:00 - 14:00 and 16:00 - 19:00 on Wednesday, 2 May 2018. Participants are encouraged to check the CCTV in the venue to confirm the date, time and room location as these may be subject to change.
