



Concept note for the Second Dialogue under the United Arab Emirates Just Transition Work Programme

2 October 2024 9:00 a.m - 6:00 p.m. | 3 October 2024 9:00 a.m. – 4:00 p.m.

Maritim Jolie Ville Resort, Sharm el-Sheikh, Egypt

I. Background

1. The Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Paris Agreement (CMA) decided, at its fourth session, to establish a work programme on just transition pathways to achieving the goals of the Paris Agreement outlined in Article 2, paragraph 1, in the context of Article 2, paragraph 2¹.
2. Decision 3/CMA.5 established the scope and modalities of the work programme and also decided that the work programme shall be implemented under the guidance of the Subsidiary Body for Scientific and Technological Advice (SBSTA) and the Subsidiary Body for Implementation (SBI) and that at least two dialogues shall be held each year as part of the work programme, with one to be held prior to the first regular sessions of the subsidiary bodies, starting with their sixtieth sessions (June 2024), and one prior to the second regular sessions of the subsidiary bodies, starting with their sixty-first sessions (November 2024), and that such dialogues should be conducted in hybrid format to allow both in-person and virtual participation.
3. The Chairs of the subsidiary bodies invited Parties, observers and other non-Party stakeholders to submit views on work to be undertaken under, as well as possible topics for the dialogues under, the work programme via the submission portal by 15 February 2024. The First Dialogue under the UAE Just Transition Work Programme took place prior to SB 60 in Bonn on the 2 and 3 June 2024 and focused on “Just Transition pathways to achieving the goals of the Paris Agreement through NDCs, NAPs and LT-LEDs”.
4. SB 60 invited the Chairs to consider, in deciding on the topic for the second dialogue in a transparent and consultative manner, the outcomes of the first hybrid dialogue and the inputs provided by Parties during the joint contact group on the work programme in the light of the elements contained in paragraph 2 of decision 3/CMA.5. Following the Informal virtual consultation on potential topics for the Second Dialogue under the UAE Just Transition Work Programme on 18 July 2024, the Chairs of the subsidiary bodies decided on the topic to be discussed at the second hybrid dialogue to be held this year would be, “Ensuring support for people-centric and equitable just transition pathways with a focus on the whole-of-society approach and the workforce.” They also identified the specific areas of focus as below:
 1. Approaches for empowering all actors and segments of the society for a fair and inclusive workforce transition to meet Paris Agreement goals.
 2. Unpacking the full range of means of implementation (Finance, Technology and Capacity Building) for a just transition of the work force: exploring current approaches, opportunities and gaps; and
 3. International cooperation and partnerships for people-centric and equitable just transitions.”

II. Ensuring Support for People-Centric and Equitable Just Transition Pathways: A Focus on the whole-of-society approach and the workforce

5. Recognising the importance of the best available science for effective climate action and policymaking,² science shows that the impacts of climate change affect those in vulnerable situations the hardest. Science also shows that prioritizing equity, climate justice, social justice, inclusion and just transition processes can enable adaptation, ambitious mitigation actions and climate-resilient development.³ Adaptation and mitigation actions that prioritise equity, social justice, climate justice, rights-based approaches, and inclusivity lead to more sustainable outcomes, reduce trade-offs, support transformative change and advance climate resilient development.⁴ This points towards the need to ensure that the pathways towards transition to a low-carbon economy are people-centric and include a whole-of-society approach to ensure just transitions in the face of the global climate crisis.
6. A whole-of society approach aimed at maximizing opportunities stemming from the transitions in a way that contributes to equity and social justice while minimizing and adequately addressing risks stemming from the transition pathways is essential to avoid exacerbating existing inequalities and penalizing vulnerable groups to ensure just transitions. Recognizing and respecting labor rights throughout these transitions also plays a key role in ensuring just transitions that maximize opportunities and minimize risks for workers and communities alike.
7. The second hybrid dialogue aims to provide the space to exchange on best practices, actionable solutions, challenges, and opportunities with regards to empowering all actors and segments of society, while unpacking the full range of means of implementation, and discussing the role of international cooperation and partnerships in the context of just transitions, with discussions around the specific focus topics described in more detail below.

A. Approaches for empowering all actors and segments of the society for a fair and inclusive workforce transition to meet Paris Agreement goals

8. While just transition of the workforce and the creation of decent work and quality jobs in accordance with nationally defined development priorities is integral to mitigating the potential socio-economic impacts of transition to a low-carbon economy, it is important to recognize that there is no one size fits all' approach to just transition of the workforce in the light of different national circumstances. Just transition pathways must be tailored to each individual country and undertaken in a way that supports affected workers and communities while enhancing access to the opportunities that emerge from the low carbon transition.
9. Empowering all actors and segments of society is crucial for ensuring just transition pathways, including for the workforce. The second hybrid dialogue will provide an opportunity to discuss approaches for empowering all actors and segments of society for a fair and inclusive workforce transition, including through recognizing labour rights, promoting access to social protection, social dialogue, participation, and collaboration among all relevant stakeholders, including workers, employers, governments, and civil society organizations.

B. Unpacking the full range of means of implementation (Finance, Technology and Capacity Building) for a just transition of the work force

10. Just transition pathways require comprehensive approaches that addresses the full range of challenges faced by workers and communities, including the provision of adequate financial resources to support job training, retraining, and other social support programs. The use of policy can play a role in driving national and international finance towards fostering just transitions for the workforce and people in vulnerable situations, including the poor, women, youth, indigenous peoples, and other people underrepresented in economic sectors.
11. Exchanges that have taken place during the [Technical Dialogue on Financing for gender-responsive just transitions and climate action](#), and the [2023 Forum of the Standing Committee on Finance: Financing Just Transitions](#) and [2024 Forum of the Standing Committee on Finance: Accelerating climate action and resilience through gender-responsive financing](#), highlight that gender-responsive approaches can be integral to providing equal opportunities to jobs in impacted and emerging job markets, ensuring just transition pathways, and strengthening climate action.
12. People-centric and equitable just transition pathways also involve investing in technologies that can create new jobs and opportunities, and some countries are already connecting and exploring synergies between just transition and the digital transition agenda given the key role played by digital technologies in many sectors.⁵
13. Providing targeted capacity-building programs to equip workers with the skills needed for a greener and more sustainable economy is also key. Targeted, intentional, and integrated policies are needed to ensure that skills development does not reproduce occupational inequalities and stereotypes but is instead used to promote decent work for all in the green economy. Strengthened social dialogue and partnerships throughout the planning, design, and implementation stages of policies, coupled with robust national and sectoral policies that align skills development with green job opportunities, can significantly accelerate a just transition.⁶

C. International cooperation and partnerships for people-centric and equitable just transitions

14. International cooperation can play an essential role in supporting just transitions. The second hybrid dialogue will provide an opportunity to explore the role that international cooperation can play as an enabler of just transition pathways towards achieving the goals of the Paris Agreement. It will also explore how partnerships can also contribute towards people-centric and equitable just transition particularly through knowledge sharing, exchanging best practices, and through the provision of resources. The specific needs and challenges of different groups of workers, such as women, youth, and communities in vulnerable situations, can be identified and addressed by fostering partnerships and international cooperation through which countries can learn from each other and accelerate progress towards a just transition.
15. International partnerships can also help to mobilize the necessary financial resources and technical expertise to support countries in their efforts to transition to low-carbon economies.
