

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


Gender under the UNFCCC



Priority theme

Achieving gender equality and the empowerment of all women and girls in the context of climate change, environmental and disaster risk reduction policies and programmes

First-ever CSW interrogating the negative impacts of climate change and disasters on gender equality and women's empowerment

Provided recommendations through Agreed Conclusions (ACs) for implementation and follow-up by governments and other stakeholders

[Para 62] Calls for governments at all levels and as appropriate, with the relevant entities of the UN system and international and regional organizations, and invites civil society, inter alia, women's organizations, youth-led organizations, feminist groups, faith-based organizations, the private sector and national human rights institutions to take action.

GENDER EQUALITY AT THE CENTRE

Normative Frameworks/Inter-governmental

Human rights: "Failure to take measures to prevent foreseeable human rights harm caused by climate change, or to regulate activities contributing to such harm, could constitute a violation of States' human rights obligations."

- •HRC and GA resolutions on the right to a clean, healthy and sustainable environment (A/RES/76/300 in the GA; A/HRC/48/13 in the Human Rights Council)
- •CEDAW:
- •(1) guidelines for govts to talk about how CC affects women and girls;
- •(2) GR #37 (2018) provides grounds to apply linkages between human rights and the gendered impacts of climate change
- •The gender and climate nexus is being reported/mentioned through the UPR cycles of the HRC

Beijing Declaration and Platform for Action

- •Critical Area of Concern on "Women and the Environment": commitments associated with the gender-climate nexus
- •Beijing+25: provided a stronger link to the 2030 Agenda; highlights progress on gender equality in the context of the negative impacts of climate change

2030 Agenda

- Monitoring the gender-responsiveness of climate-oriented SDGs and Targets
- •UN-Women Periodic reports on gender equality in the context of the SDGs

UNFCCC and the other Rio Conventions

- •Implementation of the respective action plans for gender equality
- •Synergies across the gender action plans

Commission on the Status of Women & Other Inter-governmental Bodies

- •66th Session on Climate, Environment and Disaster Risk Reduction Policies and Programmes: first dedicated Session although previous CSWs have addressed climate change
- •Climate change has been discussed in the Security Council since 2007, but there has not yet been a resolution.

The GAP and CSW 66

Capacity building, knowledge

- Para 62c: Respect and fulfilment of existing commitments and obligations under the international instruments on climate change
- Para 62i: Integration of gender perspectives into the design, funding, implementation, monitoring and evaluation of policies and programmes
- •Para 62kk: Bridge the digital divide including the gender digital divide
- Para 62I: Strengthen coordination and gender mainstreaming across sectors and all levels of government
- •Para 62m: Strengthen the capacity of national gender equality mechanisms at all levels, especially in LDCs and SIDS
- Para 62ss: Strengthen the capacity and coordination of national statistical and data production offices and government institutions
- •Para 62tt: Support and fund research and analysis to better understand impacts

Gender balance, participation and women's leadership

- •Para 62cc: Participation and leadership in rural areas
- •Para 62dd: Rights of indigenous women/girls.
- •Para 62h: Integration of a disability-inclusive and gender perspective
- Para 62o: Participation and leadership at all levels of relevant decision- making bodies and processes
- •Para 62q: Protection and promotion of the rights of all women and girls with disabilities, and their participation

Coherence

- Although CSW66 ACs mention several key normative and policy frameworks, it does not refer to their coherence
- By focusing on coherence, the GAP is instrumental in filling this gap to guide gender-responsive implementation at critical policy intersections

The GAP and CSW 66...cont./d

Genderresponsive implementation


- Para 62m: Strengthen the capacity of national gender equality mechanisms at all levels, particularly in LDCs and SIDS
- Para 62s: Leverage and strengthen the full, equal and meaningful participation of women and the influence of all women and girls and encourage sharing and learning
- Para 62x: Commitment for increased gender-responsive investment

Monitoring and Reporting

- Para 62g: Ensure the full, equal, effective and meaningful participation, representation and leadership of women, at all levels of decision-making bodies and processes, and set specific targets and timelines to achieve gender balance
- Para 62p: Accountability for the full, equal and meaningful participation and leadership of young women
- Para 62i: Integrate gender perspectives into the design, funding, implementation, monitoring and evaluation of policies and programmes at the national, regional and international levels

What UN-Women is Doing in Response

- CSW66 a strong reference point for the organization's work on the gender and climate nexus
- Strengthening internal coordination on and taking stock of our global work on climate
- Strengthening regional and national capacities on gender and climate
- Implementing policy work and programmes on the gender and climate nexus at regional and country levels, e.g., climate-resilient agriculture; data and statistics
- Continuing to deepen support to the three Rio Conventions
- Developing a climate strategy

Gender Plan of Action

Adopted at COP 15 through decision 15/11

The GPA recognizes:

- The importance of advancing efforts to achieve gender equality and women's and girl's empowerment to ensure the effective implementation of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework (KMGBF)
- That the full and effective participation and leadership of women in all aspects of Convention processes, particularly in policy and action at national and local levels is vital

The GPA invites:

 Relevant organizations of the United Nations family and other international organizations and initiatives to support coherent gender responsive implementation of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework, through identifying synergies and drawing on relevant experience from related processes;



Expected Outcome 1-Objectives

Proposed Objectives:

- Increase all women and girls' rights to ownership and control over land and access to natural resources and to water, to support the conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity
- Ensure equal access for women to resources, services and technologies
- Ensure gender equitable access in relation to access and benefit sharing instruments, as appropriate
- Promote women's empowerment and entrepreneurial opportunities in biodiversity-based supply chains and sectors
- Identify and eliminate, prevent and respond to all forms of gender-based discrimination and violence









Expected outcome 2-Objectives

Proposed Objectives:

- Increase opportunities and strengthen participation and leadership of women at all levels of action, engagement and decision-making
- Enhance the meaningful and effective participation and leadership of women in Convention processes
- Integrate human rights and gender equality considerations into national biodiversity strategies and action plans (NBSAPs)









Expected Outcome 3 – Objectives

- Develop national capacity to produce and use gender and biodiversity data, including relevant data disaggregation
- Strengthen evidence base, understanding, analysis of genderrelated impacts of implementation of post-2020 KMGBF
- Support access to information and public participation of women's organizations, networks in implementation and reporting of post-2020 KMGBF
- Ensure coherent gender responsive implementation of post-2020 KMGBF
- Ensure reporting on gender responsive implementation
- Allocate adequate human and financial resources
