#### Climate Convergence



The Global Youth Statement represents the collective voice of over 2200 children and youth from 80+ countries, volunteering 76,000+ hours to shape climate policy. It speaks directly to COP 29 negotiation rooms, aligning with provisional agendas and guiding stakeholders toward urgent, ambitious climate action.

The **Preamble** of the Paris Agreement acknowledged the need for "the widest possible participation of all countries" and emphasizes the importance of engaging various stakeholders, including CSOs and NGOs.

- "Recognizing the importance of the engagements of all levels of government and various, in accordance with respective national legislations of Parties, in addressing climate change ..."
- "Acknowledging that climate change is a common concern of humankind, Parties should, when taking action to address climate change, respect, promote and consider their respective obligations on ... intergenerational equity."

#### **Glasgow Climate Pact:**



- Para. 63: "Expresses appreciation for the outcomes of the sixteenth Conference of Youth, organized by the constituency of children and youth non-governmental organizations and held in Glasgow in October 2021, and the "Youth4Climate2021: Driving Ambition" event hosted by italy in Milan, in September 2021"
- Para 64: "Urges Parties and stakeholders to ensure meaningful youth participation and representation in multilateral, national and local decision-making processes, including under the Convention and the Paris Agreement.

#### **Key demands from COP29**

#### **Recognizing the Conferences of Youth**

- Recalling the Sharm el-Sheikh Implementation Plan, paras 55 and 56, the Glasgow Climate Pact, paras 63 and 64, and Decisions 23/CP.27 and 22/CMA.4, we encourage Parties to:
  - Express appreciation to the children and youth Constituency (YOUNGO) for co-organizing the youth climate dialogue with the Presidency of the twenty-eighth session of the Conference of the Parties and note the Global Youth Statement of the Nineteenth Conference of Youth, organised by the constituency (YOUNGO) and held in Baku, Azerbaijan, in November 2024.
  - Take note of the outcomes of the Local and Regional Conferences of Youth and meaningfully engage with children and the youth at these conferences;





#### Key demands from CMA 6 Agenda

- Ensure environmental integrity in carbon markets
- Implement robust safeguards for human rights and indigenous peoples
- Allocate proceeds from carbon markets to mitigation and adaptation efforts





#### Key demands from CMA 6 Agenda

#### Item 4: Matters Relating to the Global Stocktake (GST)

- Recalling **Decision 19/CMA.1** and acknowledging the Youth Stocktake report that was published in 2023 at COP28,
  - Recognise the Youth Stocktake process and embed reporting on youth engagement and inclusion in existing processes such as NDCs, NAPs, Biennial Transparency Reports, etc. These reports should feed into the recurrent Youth Stocktake reports, which aim to measure and monitor youth actions nationally, regionally and globally to ensure accountability.
- Include indigenous peoples in nature-based solutions and NDCs
- Strengthen disaster risk reduction and climate migration policies
- Triple global energy transition investment to \$4.5 trillion annually by 2050





#### Key demands from CMP 19 Agenda

- Allocate funding for youth-led adaptation initiatives
- Implement fast-tracked access to climate funds for community-based applicants
- Establish capacity-building programs for youth in climate adaptation

#### Key demands from SBSTA 61 Agenda





- Integrate child-specific protection measures into climate strategies
- Develop a taxonomy of climate-related mental health impacts
- Prioritize climate-sensitive diseases in disaster management plans





#### Key demands from SBI 61 Agenda

- Establish mechanisms to fund Action for Climate Empowerment (ACE)
- Create a dedicated platform for ACE to foster global collaboration
- Ensure youth participation in climate policies

# Key demands for the Secretariat, NDCs 3.0, and NCQG





#### **Secretariat:**

- End corporate sponsorships of COPs by polluting industries
- Implement a Declaration of Interest for all stakeholders
- Ensure fossil fuel representatives are excluded from closed sessions

#### **NDCs 3.0:**

- Include formal mechanisms for youth and indigenous participation in NDC formulation
- Regularly update NDCs to align with 1.5°C target
- Integrate health co-benefits into NDCs

#### NCQG:

- Push for a \$1 trillion annual climate finance goal
- Prioritize grant-based, concessional public finance to developing countries
- Ensure transparency in climate finance tracking



#### **The Presidency Youth Climate Champion**

The Presidency Youth Climate Champion (PYCC) role was established at COP 28 and requests each incoming Presidency of the Conference of the Parties and the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Paris Agreement to confirm its appointee for Presidency youth climate champion.

The PYCC role was decided to act on behalf of the Presidency of the Conference of the Parties to facilitate the enhancement of the meaningful, inclusive engagement of youth in climate action, including within the UNFCCC process

#### **COP29 PYCC activities:**

#### The PYCC enhance Inclusion

by working to strengthen inclusion and representation of youth in climate processes, especially those

from communities that are most marginalized and affected by climate change.









#### Youth policy implementation

Advocate strong implementation of COP decisions related to children and youth inclusion, as well as advocating for initiatives such as the YOUNGO Youth Stocktake process.

#### Unlocking opportunities for youth and children participation

Facilitate support for youth and children's participation at COY and COP, including an International Youth Climate Delegate Program and local youth delegate program with UNICEF.

#### Championing youth inclusion in Party Delegations

Advocate for national delegations to include youth and facilitating connections and opportunities for young negotiators.

#### Children and youth logistical support

Providing essential support for children and youth accessibility at COP, including through support on, accommodation, travel and visas.

by relaying youth priorities, demands, and policy proposals directly to decision-makers within the COP Presidency, governments, the UNFCCC and beyond



#### Elevate youth climate policy ambitions proposals

Amplify youth policy proposals and create spaces for youth input

#### **Connect Youth to Policymakers**

Facilitate opportunities for direct interaction between youth civil society and government negotiators, including creating space for a Youth-led Climate Forum during COP and showcasing

#### **Engaging youth in NDCs**

Raise awareness of local and regional youth policy efforts, and campaign for youth to be embedded in NDC revision and implementation.

#### The PYCCs catalyse action

by leveraging COP to advance, resource, and monitor youth-led climate action, enabling funding and ensuring accountability



#### Embedding youth in the agenda at COP

Ensuring a thematic day that focuses on children and youth at COP, as well as embedding youth across the full Presidency Action Agenda.

Provide operational support for children and youth spaces at COP such as the Children and Youth Pavilion in the blue zone and Youth House in the green zone, as well as at other key UNFCCC gatherings
