4. Matters relating to the global stocktake¹⁰

(a) <u>Procedural and logistical elements of the overall global stocktake process</u>

16. *Background*: CMA 5 welcomed the conclusion of the first global stocktake and, recalling paragraph 15 of decision <u>19/CMA.1</u>, decided that consideration of refining the procedural and logistical elements of the overall global stocktake process on the basis of experience from the first global stocktake shall commence at SB 60 and conclude at CMA 6.¹¹ Matters relating to this agenda sub-item are considered under the SBSTA and the SBI.¹²

17. CMA 5 requested the secretariat to prepare a synthesis report on submissions by Parties and non-Party stakeholders on experience and lessons learned in relation to conducting the first global stocktake in time to inform the refinement mentioned in paragraph 16 above.¹³

18. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to take any action it deems appropriate on the basis of the recommendations of the SBSTA and the SBI.

(b) <u>Report on the annual global stocktake dialogue referred to in paragraph 187 of decision 1/CMA.5</u>

19. *Background*: CMA 5 requested the Chairs of the subsidiary bodies to organize an annual global stocktake dialogue, starting at SB 60, and requested the secretariat to prepare a report for consideration at CMA $6.^{14}$

20. The secretariat received requests from the United States of America on 4 June 2024 and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland on 5 June 2024 to include this matter in the provisional agenda for CMA 6.

5. United Arab Emirates just transition work programme

22. *Background*: CMA 5 decided that the implementation of the United Arab Emirates just transition work programme shall start immediately after that session under the guidance of the SBSTA and the SBI through a joint contact group to be convened at each of their sessions, starting at SB 60, with a view to the subsidiary bodies recommending a draft decision for consideration and adoption by the CMA at each of its sessions.¹⁵ Accordingly, matters relating to this agenda item are considered under the SBSTA and the SBI.¹⁶

23. *Action:* The CMA will be invited to take any action it deems appropriate on the basis of the recommendations of the SBSTA and the SBI.

6. Sharm el-Sheikh mitigation ambition and implementation work programme

24. *Background*: CMA 3 decided to establish a work programme to urgently scale up mitigation ambition and implementation in this critical decade.¹⁷

25. CMA 4 requested the secretariat to prepare, under the guidance of the co-chairs of the work programme, a report on each of the dialogues held as part of the work programme, and to prepare an annual report comprising a compilation of the individual dialogue reports for consideration by the CMA, the SBSTA and the SBI.¹⁸

26. CMA 4 also requested the SBSTA and the SBI to consider progress in implementing the work programme with a view to recommending a draft decision for consideration and adoption by the CMA at each of its sessions.¹⁹

27. Accordingly, matters relating to this agenda item are considered under the SBSTA and the SBI.²⁰

28. CMA 5 requested the secretariat to include information on the investment-focused events in the report on each of the dialogues held as part of the work programme.²¹

29. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to consider the annual report prepared by the secretariat and to take any action it deems appropriate, including on the basis of the recommendations of the SBSTA and the SBI.

7. Further guidance on features of nationally determined contributions, referred to in paragraph 26 of decision 1/CP.21

30. *Background*: CMA 1 noted that features of NDCs are outlined in the relevant provisions of the Paris Agreement²² and decided to continue consideration of further guidance on features of NDCs at the CMA session to be held in November 2024.²³

31. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to consider this matter and to take any action it deems appropriate.

8. Reporting and review pursuant to Article 13 of the Paris Agreement: provision of financial and technical support to developing country Parties for reporting and capacity-building

32. *Background*: CMA 3 decided that this matter will be considered at CMA 4 and at each session thereafter, including consideration of the support provided to developing country Parties for reporting and related capacity-building under Article 13 of the Paris Agreement.²⁴

33. CMA 5 requested the secretariat to undertake several activities related to this matter in the course of 2024 and 2025.²⁵

34. The secretariat held regional online workshops²⁶ from 15 to 19 April 2024 and an inperson workshop²⁷ in conjunction with SB 60 on support available to developing country Parties to implement the enhanced transparency framework. It also held an in-session facilitative dialogue²⁸ in conjunction with SB 60 for sharing of experience in gathering, analysing and managing data to implement the enhanced transparency framework.²⁹

35. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to refer the consideration of this matter to the SBI and to take any action it deems appropriate on the basis of the recommendations of the SBI.

9. Matters relating to adaptation

(a) <u>Global goal on adaptation</u>

36. *Background*: CMA 5 adopted the United Arab Emirates Framework for Global Climate Resilience and decided that the purpose of the Framework is to guide the

achievement of the global goal on adaptation and the review of overall progress in achieving it. 30

37. CMA 5 requested the SBSTA and the SBI to initiate consideration of matters relating to the global goal on adaptation at SB 60 with a view to providing recommendations for consideration and adoption at CMA 7 at the latest.³¹

38. At SB 60, the SBSTA and the SBI agreed to consider additional work by technical experts,³² and associated modalities, at SB 61 with a view to making a recommendation on this matter for consideration at CMA $6.^{33}$

39. CMA 5 decided to launch a two-year United Arab Emirates–Belém work programme on indicators for measuring progress achieved towards the targets referred to in paragraphs 9-10 of decision 2/CMA.5, to be carried out jointly by the SBSTA and the SBI starting after that session.³⁴

40. Accordingly, matters relating to this agenda sub-item are considered under the SBSTA and the SBI.³⁵

41. CMA 5 requested the secretariat to undertake work to examine how transformational adaptation is defined and understood at different spatial scales and sectors, and how progress in planning and implementing transformational adaptation approaches might be assessed at the global level, for consideration at CMA 6.³⁶

42. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to take any action it deems appropriate, including on the basis of the recommendations of the SBSTA and the SBI.

(b) <u>Report of the Adaptation Committee</u>

43. *Background*: CMA 1 decided that the Adaptation Committee shall serve the Paris Agreement.³⁷ The Adaptation Committee reports annually to the COP through the subsidiary bodies.³⁸ Accordingly, matters relating to this agenda sub-item are considered under the SBSTA and the SBI.³⁹

44. SB 59 could not conclude consideration of the report of the Adaptation Committee for 2023.⁴⁰ SB 60 recommended that CMA 6 and COP 29 take note of the report of the Adaptation Committee for 2023.⁴¹

45. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to take any action it deems appropriate on the basis of the recommendations of the SBSTA and the SBI.

(c) <u>Review of the progress, effectiveness and performance of the Adaptation Committee</u>

46. *Background*: COP 27 was to review the progress, effectiveness and performance of the Adaptation Committee,⁴² and COP 26 invited CMA 4 to participate in the review as it relates to the Paris Agreement.⁴³ CMA 4 and COP 27 noted that consideration of the review could not be completed at those sessions and would therefore continue at SB 58.⁴⁴ At SB 58, Parties agreed to continue consideration at SB 59.⁴⁵ SB 59 could not conclude consideration of this matter.⁴⁶ SB 60 agreed that consideration would continue at SB 61.⁴⁷ Accordingly, matters relating to this agenda sub-item are considered under the SBSTA and the SBI.⁴⁸

47. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to take any action it deems appropriate on the basis of the recommendations of the SBSTA and the SBI.

10. Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts and joint annual report of its Executive Committee and the Santiago network for averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage associated with the adverse effects of climate change

48. *Background*: COP 19 and 20 requested the WIM Executive Committee to report annually to the COP through the subsidiary bodies and to make recommendations, as appropriate.⁴⁹ Accordingly, matters relating to the report of the Executive Committee are considered under the SBSTA and the SBI.⁵⁰ Article 8, paragraph 2, of the Paris Agreement states that the WIM shall be subject to the authority and guidance of the CMA and may be enhanced and strengthened as determined by the CMA.

49. CMA 5 requested the Advisory Board of the Santiago network for averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage associated with the adverse effects of climate change to develop its draft rules of procedure with a view to recommending them, through SB 61, for consideration and adoption by the governing body or bodies at the session(s) in November 2024.⁵¹

50. The governing body or bodies shall consider the joint annual report of the Santiago network and the WIM Executive Committee, submitted through the subsidiary bodies in accordance with paragraph 19 of annex I to decision <u>12/CMA.4</u>, endorsed by decision <u>11/CP.27</u>, and other future decisions of the governing body or bodies, and provide guidance thereon.⁵²

51. Accordingly, the matters referred to in paragraphs 49–50 above are considered under the SBSTA and the SBI.⁵³

52. CMA 5 noted that considerations related to the governance of the WIM will continue at CMA $6.^{54}$

53. CMA 2 recommended that the next review of the WIM be held in 2024 and every five years thereafter, with the subsidiary bodies to develop the terms of reference for each review

at their sessions immediately before the sessions at which they will undertake the review and to undertake future reviews and forward the outputs of the reviews to the governing body or bodies.⁵⁵ Accordingly, SB 60 finalized the terms of reference for the 2024 review and it was agreed to undertake that review at SB 61 on the basis of those terms of reference and to forward the outcomes to the appropriate body or bodies for consideration.⁵⁶

54. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to take any action it deems appropriate, including on the basis of the recommendations of the SBSTA and the SBI. It will also be invited to elect members of the WIM Executive Committee.

11. Matters relating to finance

(a) <u>New collective quantified goal on climate finance</u>

55. *Background*: COP 21 decided that, in accordance with Article 9, paragraph 3, of the Paris Agreement, developed countries intend to continue their existing collective mobilization goal through 2025 in the context of meaningful mitigation actions and transparency on implementation; and that prior to 2025 the CMA shall set a new collective quantified goal from a floor of USD 100 billion per year, taking into account the needs and priorities of developing countries.⁵⁷

56. The CMA decided to initiate at CMA 3 deliberations on setting an NCQG.⁵⁸ CMA 3 set out its arrangements for work to be conducted in 2022–2024, including establishing an ad hoc work programme and convening annual high-level ministerial dialogues.

57. CMA 5 requested the co-chairs of the ad hoc work programme to include in their annual report a substantive framework for a draft negotiating text capturing progress made for consideration at CMA 6.⁵⁹ It decided to conduct at least three meetings under the ad hoc work programme in 2024, back-to-back with technical expert dialogues.⁶⁰

58. Technical expert dialogues and meetings under the ad hoc work programme took place in Cartagena, Colombia, from 23 to 26 April 2024,⁶¹ and at SB 60,⁶² and will take place in Baku, Azerbaijan, from 9 to 12 September 2024.⁶³

59. The last high-level ministerial dialogue will take place in Baku on 9 October 2024 with a view to providing guidance for the deliberations on setting the NCQG at CMA 6.⁶⁴

60. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to consider the annual report of the co-chairs of the ad hoc work programme, including the substantive framework for a draft negotiating text capturing progress made, and the summary of the deliberations at the 2024 high-level ministerial dialogue on the NCQG and to take any action it deems appropriate.

(b) <u>Matters relating to the Standing Committee on Finance</u>

61. *Background*: COP 21 decided that the SCF shall serve the Paris Agreement in line with its functions and responsibilities established under the COP.⁶⁵

62. CMA 5 requested the SCF to report to CMA 6 on progress in implementing its workplan for 2024.⁶⁶

63. COP 27 adopted the terms of reference for the second review of the functions of the SCF and requested SBI 59 to complete the work on that review with a view to recommending draft decisions on the matter for consideration and adoption at CMA 5 and COP 28.⁶⁷ At SBI 59, Parties agreed to continue consideration of the matter at SBI 61.⁶⁸ Accordingly, matters relating to the second review of the SCF are considered under the SBI.⁶⁹

64. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to consider the SCF report and the recommendations of the SBI on the review of the functions of the SCF and to take any action it deems appropriate.

It decided that the guidance to the GCF in relevant decisions of the COP, including those agreed before the adoption of the Agreement, shall apply mutatis mutandis to the Agreement.⁷⁰

COP 21 recommended that the CMA provide guidance to the GEF on policies, programme priorities and eligibility criteria related to the Agreement for transmission by the COP. It decided that the guidance to the GEF in relevant decisions of the COP, including those agreed before the adoption of the Agreement, shall apply mutatis mutandis to the Agreement.⁷¹

68. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to consider the information provided by the GEF and to provide guidance to it on policies, programme priorities and eligibility criteria related to the Paris Agreement for transmission by the COP.

(e) <u>Report of the Fund for responding to Loss and Damage and guidance to the Fund</u>

69. *Background*: CMA 4 and COP 27 decided, in the context of establishing the new funding arrangements for responding to loss and damage referred to in paragraph 2 of decisions 2/CMA.4 and 2/CP.27, to establish a fund whose mandate includes a focus on addressing loss and damage.⁷² CMA 4 and COP 27 established a Transitional Committee,⁷³ and CMA 5 and COP 28 welcomed the report of the Transitional Committee⁷⁴ containing recommendations on the operationalization of the new funding arrangements.⁷⁵

70. CMA 5 and COP 28 approved the Governing Instrument of the Fund, contained in annex I to decisions 5/CMA.5 and 1/CP.28, and decided that the Fund will be serviced by a new, dedicated and independent secretariat and governed and supervised by a Board, and to designate the Fund as an entity entrusted with the operation of the Financial Mechanism of the Convention, also serving the Paris Agreement, which will be accountable to and function under the guidance of the CMA and the COP.⁷⁶

71. CMA 5 and COP 28 invited the World Bank, subject to paragraphs 20-24 of decisions <u>5/CMA.5</u> and <u>1/CP.28</u>, to operationalize the Fund as a World Bank hosted financial intermediary fund for an interim period of four years, starting from the sessions of the CMA and the COP at which the Board of the Fund confirms that the conditions referred to in paragraph 20 of decisions <u>5/CMA.5</u> and <u>1/CP.28</u> can be met, with the Fund to be serviced by a new, dedicated and independent secretariat hosted by the World Bank.⁷⁷

72. The Governing Instrument of the Fund states that the Board of the Fund will receive guidance from the CMA and the COP on its policies, programme priorities and eligibility criteria, take appropriate action in response to the guidance received from the CMA and the COP and submit annual reports to the CMA and the COP for their consideration.⁷⁸

73. The funding arrangements, contained in annex II to decisions 5/CMA.5 and 1/CP.28, provide that an annual high-level dialogue on coordination and complementarity with representatives from the main entities that form part of the funding arrangements will be organized, to be co-convened by the Fund and the United Nations Secretary-General or a jointly designated high-level representative.⁷⁹ The Board of the Fund will report on the dialogue through its annual report to the CMA and the COP.⁸⁰

74. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to consider the annual report of the Board of the Fund and to take any action it deems appropriate.

75. *Background*: CMA 5 and COP 28 decided to designate the Fund as an entity entrusted with the operation of the Financial Mechanism of the Convention, also serving the Paris Agreement, which will be accountable to and function under the guidance of the CMA and the COP.⁸¹

76. CMA 5 and COP 28 also decided that arrangements with the Fund, consistent with the Governing Instrument of the Fund and to ensure that the Fund is accountable to and functions under the guidance of the CMA and the COP, are to be approved at CMA 6 and COP 29 and requested the SCF to develop these arrangements, to be concluded between the CMA, the COP and the Board of the Fund, for consideration and approval by the Board and subsequent consideration and approval at CMA 6 and COP 29.⁸²

77. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to consider the draft arrangements, to be concluded between the CMA, the COP and the Board of the Fund, developed by the SCF and to take any action it deems appropriate.

(g) Matters relating to the Adaptation Fund

78. *Background*: CMA 1 decided that the Adaptation Fund shall serve the Paris Agreement under the guidance of, and be accountable to, the CMA with respect to all matters relating to the Paris Agreement, effective 1 January 2019.⁸³ CMP 14 took note of that decision.⁸⁴

79. CMA 5 and CMP 18 requested the AFB to include in its annual report to CMA 6 and CMP 19 information on the rates of use of the increased cap on allocation per country⁸⁵ and encouraged the AFB to report on its work related to implementing its mandates from decisions <u>13/CMA.1</u> and <u>1/CMP.14</u> in its annual report to CMA 6 and CMP 19.⁸⁶

80. CMA 4 recalled paragraph 7 of decision <u>3/CMP.16</u> confirming that Parties to the Paris Agreement are eligible for membership on the AFB, and requested SBI 58 to continue consideration of matters relating to membership of the AFB, as needed, in view of the Adaptation Fund's transition to exclusively serving the Paris Agreement. CMA 5 encouraged the AFB to continue consideration of its rules of procedure in the context of serving the Paris Agreement, including after the SBI has concluded consideration of matters related to membership of the AFB.⁸⁷

82. *Background*: CMA 4 decided to launch the Sharm el-Sheikh dialogue between Parties, relevant organizations and stakeholders to exchange views on and enhance understanding of the scope of Article 2, paragraph 1(c), of the Paris Agreement and its complementarity with Article 9 of the Paris Agreement.⁸⁸

83. CMA 5 decided to continue and strengthen the Sharm el-Sheikh dialogue between Parties, relevant organizations and stakeholders to exchange views on and enhance understanding of the scope of Article 2, paragraph 1(c), of the Paris Agreement and its complementarity with Article 9 of the Paris Agreement referred to in paragraph 68 of decision <u>1/CMA.4</u>, including with regard to the operationalization and implementation of Article 2, paragraph 1(c), in 2024–2025.⁸⁹

84. CMA 5 also decided that this dialogue is to be facilitated by two co-chairs, requested the secretariat, under the guidance of the co-chairs, to organize at least two workshops per year with a view to engaging a broad range of relevant stakeholders, and also requested the co-chairs to prepare a report on the deliberations under the dialogue in 2024 and 2025 for consideration at CMA 6 and 7 respectively.⁹⁰ The first workshop took place from 12 to 13 June 2024 in Bonn. The second workshop will take place from 6 to 7 October 2024 in Sharm el-Sheikh, Egypt.

85. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to consider the report and to take any action it deems appropriate.

(i) <u>Report of developed country Parties on doubling the collective provision of climate finance</u> for adaptation to developing country Parties from 2019 levels by 2025

86. *Background*: CMA 3 urged developed country Parties to at least double their collective provision of climate finance for adaptation to developing country Parties from 2019 levels by 2025, in the context of achieving a balance between mitigation and adaptation in the provision of scaled-up financial resources, recalling Article 9, paragraph 4, of the Paris Agreement.⁹¹

87. CMA 5 noted the efforts of developed country Parties to make progress in at least doubling adaptation finance from 2019 levels by 2025.⁹²

88. CMA 5 recognized that adaptation finance will have to be significantly scaled up beyond the doubling, as per paragraph 86 of decision 1/CMA.5.

89. CMA 5 urged developed country Parties to prepare a report on the doubling of the collective provision of climate finance for adaptation to developing country Parties from 2019 levels by 2025, for consideration at CMA $6.^{93}$

90. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to consider the report and to take any action it deems appropriate.

91. *Background*: CMA 5 decided to establish the United Arab Emirates dialogue on implementing the global stocktake outcomes and that it will be operationalized starting from

CMA 6 and conclude at CMA 10, and requested SBI 60 to develop the modalities for the dialogue for consideration at CMA 6.⁹⁵ Accordingly, matters relating to the modalities for the dialogue are considered under the SBI.⁹⁶

92. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to consider this matter and to take any action it deems appropriate on the basis of the recommendations by the SBI.

(k) Seventh review of the Financial Mechanism

93. *Background*: On 5 June 2024 the secretariat received a request from the United Kingdom to include this matter in the provisional agenda for CMA 6. In accordance with rule 10(d) of the draft rules of procedure being applied, this sub-item has been included in the provisional agenda.

94. This matter has been included in the provisional agenda for sessions of the CMA since CMA 4. Consultations were undertaken by the Presidents of CMA 4 and 5 but Parties were unable to reach a consensus on the way forward.

95. Action: The CMA will be invited to take any action it deems appropriate.

12. Matters relating to technology development and transfer

(a) Joint annual report of the Technology Executive Committee and the Climate Technology Centre and Network

96. *Background*: CMA 1 adopted the technology framework under Article 10, paragraph 4, of the Paris Agreement and took note of the recommendation of the Technology Executive Committee and the Climate Technology Centre and Network to prepare and submit their joint annual report to both the CMA and the COP,⁹⁷ through the subsidiary bodies, on their activities to support the implementation of the Paris Agreement.⁹⁸

97. Accordingly, matters relating to this agenda sub-item are considered under the SBSTA and the SBI.⁹⁹

98. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to take any action it deems appropriate on the basis of the recommendations of the SBSTA and the SBI.

99. *Background*: CMA 5 decided to establish a technology implementation programme to strengthen support for the implementation of technology priorities identified by developing countries and to address the challenges identified in the first periodic assessment of the Technology Mechanism, and invited SBI 61 to take into account the technology implementation programme in its consideration of the Poznan strategic programme on technology transfer with a view to recommending a draft decision on the matter for consideration and adoption at CMA 6.¹⁰⁰

100. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to consider this matter and to take any action it deems appropriate on the basis of the recommendations of the SBI.

13. Matters relating to capacity-building

101. *Background*: The PCCB prepares annual technical progress reports on its work for submission to the COP through the SBI.¹⁰¹ CMA 2 decided that the PCCB shall serve the Paris Agreement in accordance with its mandate and terms of reference and confirmed that the PCCB shall report to both the COP and the CMA through its annual technical progress report.¹⁰²

102. COP 28 invited CMA 6 to participate in the second review of the PCCB.¹⁰³ At CMA 5, the CMA decided to also conduct the second review at CMA 6.¹⁰⁴ Matters relating to this agenda item are considered under the SBI.¹⁰⁵

103. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to take any action it deems appropriate on the basis of the recommendations of the SBI.

14. Report of the forum on the impact of the implementation of response measures

104. *Background*: CMA 1, COP 24 and CMP 14 acknowledged that a single forum on the impact of the implementation of response measures covers the work of the CMA, the COP and the CMP on all matters relating to the impact of the implementation of response measures and affirmed that the forum shall report to the CMA, the COP and the CMP.¹⁰⁶

105. CMA 1 decided that the forum shall provide recommendations for consideration by the subsidiary bodies with a view to them recommending actions for consideration and adoption by the CMA, the COP and the CMP.¹⁰⁷

106. CMA 5, COP 28 and CMP 18 adopted the updated functions, work programme and modalities of the forum and its Katowice Committee of Experts on the Impacts of the Implementation of Response Measures and requested the Committee to propose updates to its rules of procedure for the forum to consider and make recommendations to the subsidiary bodies with a view to the subsidiary bodies providing recommendations for consideration and adoption at CMA 6, COP 29 and CMP 19.¹⁰⁸

107. At SB 60, Parties agreed to continue developing the five-year workplan of the forum and its Katowice Committee on Impacts at SB 61 with a view to recommending a draft decision for consideration and adoption at the CMA 6, COP 29 and CMP 19.¹⁰⁹

108. Matters relating to this agenda item are considered under the SBSTA and the SBI.¹¹⁰

109. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to take any action it deems appropriate on the basis of the recommendations of the SBSTA and the SBI.

15. Matters relating to Article 6 of the Paris Agreement

(a) <u>Guidance on cooperative approaches referred to in Article 6, paragraph 2, of the Paris</u> Agreement and in decision 2/CMA.3

110. *Background*: CMA 3 adopted guidance on cooperative approaches referred to in Article 6, paragraph 2, of the Paris Agreement and requested the SBSTA to undertake further work on the basis of that guidance and develop recommendations for consideration and adoption at CMA 4.¹¹¹

111. CMA 4 requested the SBSTA to continue its work on the draft version of the agreed electronic format contained in annex VII to decision 6/CMA.4.¹¹² It also requested the SBSTA to continue its work on developing recommendations on the matters referred to in paragraph 16(a–b), and to develop recommendations on the matters referred to in paragraph 17, of decision 6/CMA.4 for consideration and adoption at CMA 5.¹¹³

112. CMA 5 requested SBSTA 60 to continue consideration of relevant matters mandated in decision $\frac{6}{CMA.4}$ with a view to recommending a draft decision for consideration and adoption at CMA 6.¹¹⁴ Accordingly, matters relating to this agenda sub-item are considered under the SBSTA.¹¹⁵

113. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to take any action it deems appropriate on the basis of the recommendations of the SBSTA.

(b) <u>Rules, modalities and procedures for the mechanism established by Article 6, paragraph 4,</u> of the Paris Agreement and referred to in decision 3/CMA.3

114. *Background*: CMA 3 designated the Supervisory Body for the mechanism established by Article 6, paragraph 4, of the Paris Agreement to supervise the mechanism¹¹⁶ and CMA 4 adopted its rules of procedure.¹¹⁷ In accordance with the rules, modalities and procedures for the mechanism, the Supervisory Body is to report annually to the CMA.¹¹⁸

115. CMA 5 requested SBSTA 60 to continue consideration of relevant matters mandated in decision $\frac{7}{CMA.4}$ with a view to recommending a draft decision for consideration and adoption at CMA 6.¹¹⁹ Accordingly, matters relating to this agenda sub-item are considered under the SBSTA.¹²⁰

116. CMA 5 requested the Supervisory Body to continue the relevant work to operationalize the mechanism with a view to elaborating and further developing recommendations for consideration and adoption at CMA $6.^{121}$

117. Action: The CMA will be invited to consider the annual report and the recommendations of the Supervisory Body with a view to adopting the recommendations and to provide guidance to the Supervisory Body, as appropriate. The CMA will also be invited to take any other action it deems appropriate, including on the basis of the recommendations

of the SBSTA. It will further be invited to elect members and alternate members of the Supervisory Body.

(c) <u>Work programme under the framework for non-market approaches referred to in Article 6,</u> paragraph 8, of the Paris Agreement and in decision 4/CMA.3

118. *Background*: CMA 3 adopted the work programme under the framework for nonmarket approaches¹²² and established the GCNMA to implement the framework and the work programme, to be convened by the SBSTA Chair during sessions of the SBSTA as a contact group.¹²³ The progress and outcomes of the work programme will be reported at each session of the CMA, as appropriate, on the basis of information resulting from implementation of the work programme activities.¹²⁴

119. CMA 5 requested the secretariat to complete the development of the UNFCCC webbased platform for non-market approaches¹²⁵ and fully operationalize it as soon as possible, and no later than GCNMA 5, and to notify the UNFCCC national focal points for Article 6, paragraph 8, of the Paris Agreement, where identified, of the deployment of the fully operational UNFCCC web-based platform; and also requested the secretariat to develop and update, as necessary, a manual on the process for submitting and recording information on non-market approaches on the web-based platform.¹²⁶

120. Matters relating to this agenda sub-item are considered under the SBSTA.¹²⁷

121. *Action*: The CMA will be invited to consider the report of the GCNMA and to take any action it deems appropriate on the basis of the recommendations of the SBSTA.

16. Matters relating to the committee to facilitate implementation and promote compliance referred to in Article 15, paragraph 2, of the Paris Agreement

122. *Background*: The Paris Agreement Implementation and Compliance Committee reports annually to the CMA.¹²⁸ CMA 5 took note of the information contained in the annual report of the Paris Agreement Implementation and Compliance Committee,¹²⁹ including the recommendation that, with respect to paragraph 2 of decision <u>20/CMA.1</u>, the CMA undertake the first review of the Committee's modalities and procedures at its session in 2024.^{130, 131}
