I. Opening of the session

(Agenda item 1)

1. CMA 6, convened pursuant to Article 16, paragraph 6, of the Paris Agreement, was held at Baku Stadium in Baku, Azerbaijan, from 11 to 24 November 2024.¹ Mukhtar Babayev (Azerbaijan), President of CMA 6, opened the session on 11 November.

II. Organizational matters

(Agenda item 2)

A. Adoption of the agenda

(Agenda sub-item 2(a))

2. At its 1st meeting,² the CMA considered document [FCCC/PA/CMA/2024/1/Add.1](#), containing the supplementary provisional agenda. The President recalled the understanding reached among Parties with regard to the adoption of the agendas for the sessions of the governing and subsidiary bodies outlined at the resumed 1st meeting of COP 29, on 11 November.³

3. The President proposed that the supplementary provisional agenda for CMA 6 be amended to reflect this understanding, with sub-item 11(k) and items 17–18 deleted.

4. Regarding the placement of the sub-item titled “United Arab Emirates dialogue on implementing the global stocktake outcomes referred to in paragraph 97 of decision [1/CMA.5](#)”, the President proposed to retain it under agenda item 11, “Matters relating to finance”, with the following footnote, as in the provisional agenda for CMA 6:⁴ “The placement of this sub-item in the agenda does not prejudice outcomes on the modalities of the dialogue being considered under the SBI.” The President reassured Parties that he would provide adequate space for Presidency consultations for discussions on a range of substantive matters included in the global stocktake outcome,⁵ ensuring complementarity with the discussions under the SBI on the modalities of the United Arab Emirates dialogue on implementing the global stocktake outcomes.

5. On the proposal by the President, the CMA adopted the agenda as follows:

6. At the same meeting, statements were made by representatives of nine Parties.⁸

B. Election of additional officers

(Agenda sub-item 2(b))

7. At the 1st meeting of CMA 6, the President informed the CMA that, as stated during the resumed 1st meeting of COP 29 and CMP 19, Julio Cordano (Chile) had begun consultations on the election of officers to bodies under the Convention, the Kyoto Protocol and the Paris Agreement.
8. The President invited regional groups and constituencies to submit all outstanding nominations by 16 November 2024. On a proposal by the President, the CMA decided to postpone the election until the closing plenary of CMA 6.
9. At the resumed 11th meeting, on 24 November, the President informed the CMA that, since all nominees for the Bureau of COP 29 were also from Parties to the Paris Agreement, it would not be necessary to elect an additional member of the Bureau at the election taking place at the closing plenary of COP 29.⁹
10. On a proposal by the President, the CMA elected members and alternate members of the various bodies, as contained in the list of nominations.¹⁰
11. The President informed the CMA that nominations for election of officers to bodies under the Paris Agreement were outstanding and urged regional groups and constituencies to continue consultations and submit the outstanding nominations to the secretariat as soon as possible and by 28 February 2025 at the latest. On a proposal by the President, the CMA

agreed that, once the outstanding nominations had been received by the secretariat, the nominees would be deemed elected at CMA 6 in accordance with established practice.

C. Organization of work, including for the sessions of the subsidiary bodies

(Agenda sub-item 2(c))

12. At its 1st meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA agreed to follow the organization of work agreed at the resumed 1st meeting of COP 29.¹¹

13. The President noted that the subsidiary bodies would conclude their work by 16 November and that he looked forward to hearing the outcomes of their sessions.

14. The President informed the CMA that the subsidiary bodies may recommend draft decisions and conclusions for consideration and adoption by the CMA under the following agenda items on matters already on their agendas:

15. On a proposal by the President, the CMA agreed to refer consideration of matters under agenda item 8, “Reporting and review pursuant to Article 13 of the Paris Agreement: provision of financial and technical support to developing country Parties for reporting and capacity-building”, to the SBI.

16. The President noted that the CMA would reconvene in the second week of the session to consider the decisions and conclusions recommended by the subsidiary bodies for adoption.

17. The President informed the CMA that the secretariat had prepared an update of the synthesis report on nationally determined contributions.¹²

18. The joint 4th meeting of CMA 6, COP 29 and CMP 19 and 2nd meeting of SBSTA 61 and SBI 61, on 13 November, was convened to hear opening statements.¹³

19. At the 11th meeting, on 23 November, the President reported on the outcomes of the consultations that he had, at the 1st meeting, as part of the understanding referred to in paragraph 2 above, proposed to conduct on the way forward regarding the following matters not to be included in the CMA agenda:¹⁴

(a) “Special needs and special circumstances of Africa”:¹⁵ at the consultations conducted by Jala Ibrahimova (Azerbaijan) Parties engaged in constructive discussions but could not reach consensus on a way forward;

(b) “Concerns with climate change related, trade-restrictive unilateral measures, and identifying ways to promote international cooperation with the outcome of the first global stocktake”;¹⁶

(c) “Seventh review of the Financial Mechanism”:¹⁷ at the consultations conducted by Gard Lindseth (Norway) and Ricardo Marshall (Barbados) Parties exchanged views but could not reach consensus on a way forward.

20. At the resumed 11th meeting, the President proposed that the following decisions be known as the Baku Climate Unity Pact:

(a) Decision [1/CMA.6](#), entitled “New collective quantified goal on climate finance”;

(b) Decision [2/CMA.6](#), entitled “Sharm el-Sheikh mitigation ambition and implementation work programme”;

(c) Decision [3/CMA.6](#), entitled “Global goal on adaptation”.

D. Approval of the report on credentials

(Agenda sub-item 2(d))

21. At the 11th meeting, the President referred to the report on credentials,¹⁸ submitted by the Bureau in accordance with rule 20 of the draft rules of procedure being applied.

22. On the basis of the report, the CMA accepted the credentials of Parties attending the session. In addition, the secretariat received credentials from Bhutan, Botswana and Tuvalu on 21 November 2024.

III. Reports of the subsidiary bodies

(Agenda item 3)

A. Report of the Subsidiary Body for Scientific and Technological Advice

(Agenda sub-item 3(a))

25. At the 5th meeting, on 18 November, the SBSTA Chair, Harry Vreuls (Kingdom of the Netherlands), introduced the draft report on SBSTA 61²⁰ and gave an oral report on the results of SBSTA 60 and 61.²¹

26. On a proposal by the President, the CMA took note of the report on SBSTA 60,²² the draft report on SBSTA 61 and the oral report by the SBSTA Chair. The President expressed his deep appreciation to the SBSTA Chair for his leadership and dedication in guiding the work of the SBSTA over the past two years and for supporting the Presidency in ensuring the effective management of work under the subsidiary bodies and its smooth transition to the governing bodies.

27. The President noted that recommendations of the SBSTA would be addressed under the relevant CMA agenda items.

B. Report of the Subsidiary Body for Implementation

(Agenda sub-item 3(b))

28. At the 5th meeting, the SBI Chair, Nabeel Munir (Pakistan), introduced the draft report on SBI 61²³ and gave an oral report on the results of SBI 60 and 61.²⁴

29. On a proposal by the President, the CMA took note of the report on SBI 60,²⁵ the draft report on SBI 61 and the oral report by the SBI Chair. The President expressed his deep appreciation to the SBI Chair for his leadership and dedication in guiding the work of the SBI over the past two years and for supporting the Presidency in ensuring the effective management of work under the subsidiary bodies and its smooth transition to the governing bodies.

30. The President noted that recommendations of the SBI would be addressed under the relevant CMA agenda items.

IV. Matters relating to the global stocktake

(Agenda item 4)

A. Procedural and logistical elements of the overall global stocktake process

(Agenda sub-item 4(a))

31. At its 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agendas of the SBSTA and the SBI.²⁶

32. At the resumed 5th meeting, on 18 November, the President recalled that the subsidiary bodies had forwarded this matter to the CMA for further consideration.²⁷ The CMA agreed to further consider the matter.

33. The President invited Thureya Al Ali (United Arab Emirates) and Patrick Spicer (Canada) to co-facilitate discussions on the refinement of the procedural and logistical elements of the global stocktake process.

34. At its 11th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA requested the subsidiary bodies to continue consideration of this matter at SB 62 (June 2025) on the basis of the informal note, which includes a compilation annex, available on the UNFCCC website²⁸ with a view to recommending a draft decision for consideration and adoption at CMA 7 (November 2025).

35. The CMA noted that the informal note was prepared by the co-facilitators as an effort to capture the progress and views expressed by Parties at this session, has not been agreed upon, does not reflect consensus, is not exhaustive, has no formal status and does not prejudice further work or prevent Parties from expressing any further views.

B. Report on the annual global stocktake dialogue referred to in paragraph 187 of decision 1/CMA.5

(Agenda sub-item 4(b))

36. At the 1st meeting, the President invited the CMA to consider the summary report²⁹ on the annual global stocktake dialogue that took place during SB 60.

37. On a proposal by the President, the CMA agreed to conduct informal consultations on this matter co-facilitated by Noura Alissa (Saudi Arabia) and Kaarle Kupianen (Finland).

38. At the 11th meeting, the President informed the CMA that, while there was general support for acknowledgement of the dialogue and the summary report, consideration of this matter could not be concluded at this session. In accordance with rules 10(c) and 16 of the draft rules of procedure being applied, the matter will be included in the provisional agenda for CMA 7.

V. United Arab Emirates just transition work programme

(Agenda item 5)

39. At its 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agendas of the SBSTA and the SBI.³⁰

40. At the resumed 5th meeting, the President informed the CMA that the subsidiary bodies had forwarded this matter to the CMA for further consideration.³¹ The CMA agreed to further consider the matter.

41. The President invited Georg Børsting (Norway) and Kishan Kumarsingh (Trinidad and Tobago) to continue co-facilitating discussions on this matter.

42. At its resumed 11th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA requested the subsidiary bodies to continue consideration of this matter at SB 62 with a view to recommending a draft decision for consideration and adoption at CMA 7.

VI. Sharm el-Sheikh mitigation ambition and implementation work programme

(Agenda item 6)

43. At its 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agendas of the SBSTA and the SBI.³²

44. At the 5th meeting, the Chairs of the subsidiary bodies reported that consideration of this matter could not be concluded at SB 61.³³

45. The President invited Ursula Fuentes-Hutfilter (Germany) and Maesela Kekana (South Africa) to co-facilitate discussions on the technical elements of the Sharm el-Sheikh mitigation ambition and implementation work programme. In addition, the President invited Dion George (South Africa) and Tore O. Sandvik (Norway) to conduct ministerial consultations on issues relating to the mitigation outcome.

46. At its resumed 11th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [2/CMA.6](#), entitled “Sharm el-Sheikh mitigation ambition and implementation work programme”.

VII. Further guidance on features of nationally determined contributions, referred to in paragraph 26 of decision 1/CP.21

(Agenda item 7)

47. At the 1st meeting, the President invited the CMA to continue consideration of this matter.

48. On a proposal by the President, the CMA agreed to conduct informal consultations thereon co-facilitated by Sin Liang Cheah (Singapore) and Federica Fricano (Italy).

49. At the 5th meeting, the President noted that Parties had expressed views on the matter, including those reflected in the non-exhaustive compilation of in-session submissions available on the UNFCCC website.³⁴ On a proposal by the President, the CMA agreed to continue consideration of this matter at CMA 8 (November 2026).

VIII. Reporting and review pursuant to Article 13 of the Paris Agreement: provision of financial and technical support to developing country Parties for reporting and capacity-building

(Agenda item 8)

50. At its 1st meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA agreed to refer consideration of this matter to the SBI.³⁵

51. At the resumed 5th meeting, the President informed the CMA that the SBI had agreed to forward this matter to the CMA for further consideration.³⁶ The CMA agreed to further consider the matter.

52. The President invited Sandra Motshwanedi (South Africa) and Ole-Kenneth Nielsen (Denmark) to continue co-facilitating technical discussions on the provision of financial and technical support for the implementation of Article 13 of the Paris Agreement.

53. At its 11th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [21/CMA.6](#), entitled “Provision of financial and technical support to developing country Parties for reporting and capacity-building”.

IX. Matters relating to adaptation

(Agenda item 9)

A. Global goal on adaptation

(Agenda sub-item 9(a))

54. At its 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agendas of the SBSTA and the SBI.³⁷

55. At the resumed 5th meeting, the President informed the CMA that the subsidiary bodies had forwarded this matter to the CMA for further consideration.³⁸ The CMA agreed to further consider the matter.

56. The President invited Lamin Dibba (Gambia) and Tina Kobilšek (Slovenia) to continue co-facilitating technical discussions on the global goal on adaptation. In addition, the President invited Eamon Ryan (Ireland) and Franz Tattenbach (Costa Rica) to conduct ministerial consultations on the global goal on adaptation.

57. At its resumed 11th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [3/CMA.6](#), entitled “Global goal on adaptation”.

B. Report of the Adaptation Committee

(Agenda sub-item 9(b))

58. At its 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agendas of the SBSTA and the SBI.³⁹

59. At its 5th meeting, on recommendations by the subsidiary bodies,⁴⁰ the CMA welcomed the 2023 and 2024 reports of the Adaptation Committee.⁴¹

C. Review of the progress, effectiveness and performance of the Adaptation Committee

(Agenda sub-item 9(c))

60. At its 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agendas of the SBSTA and the SBI.⁴²

61. At the 5th meeting, the President informed the CMA that the subsidiary bodies had agreed to continue consideration of this matter at SB 62.⁴³

X. Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts and joint annual report of its Executive Committee and the Santiago network for averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage associated with the adverse effects of climate change

(Agenda item 10)

62. At its 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agendas of the SBSTA and the SBI.⁴⁴

63. At the 5th meeting, the Chairs of the subsidiary bodies reported that consideration of this matter could not be concluded at SB 61,⁴⁵ and the President invited Farhan Akhtar (United States of America) and Pasha Carruthers (Cook Islands) to co-facilitate technical discussions on this matter.

64. At its 11th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [16/CMA.6](#), entitled “Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts and joint annual report of its Executive Committee and the Santiago network for averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage associated with the adverse effects of climate change”.

65. In addition, on a proposal by the President, the CMA elected members and alternate members of the Advisory Board of the Santiago network for averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage associated with the adverse effects of climate change and of the WIM Executive Committee, as reflected in the annex.

XI. Matters relating to finance

(Agenda item 11)

A. New collective quantified goal on climate finance

(Agenda sub-item 11(a))

66. At the 1st meeting, the President invited the CMA to consider the annual report of the co-chairs of the ad hoc work programme on the new collective quantified goal on climate

finance,⁴⁶ including the substantive framework for a draft negotiating text capturing progress made,⁴⁷ and the summary of the deliberations at the 2024 high-level ministerial dialogue on the new collective quantified goal on climate finance,⁴⁸ held in Baku on 9 October 2024.

67. The President thanked the co-chairs of the ad hoc work programme on the new collective quantified goal on climate finance for their leadership and efforts under the work programme.

68. The President also thanked Chris Bowen (Australia) and Yasmine Fouad (Egypt) for conducting informal ministerial consultations on climate finance on his behalf.

69. On a proposal by the President, the CMA established a contact group on this matter co-chaired by the co-chairs of the ad hoc work programme on the new collective quantified goal on climate finance.

70. At its resumed 11th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [1/CMA.6](#), entitled “New collective quantified goal on climate finance”.

71. Statements were made by representatives of seven Parties, including two on behalf of groups of Parties.⁴⁹

72. India objected, stating that the means of adopting decision [1/CMA.6](#) was unfair, and it expressed its opposition to the document.⁵⁰ The President indicated that India’s statement would be taken note of in the report on the session.⁵¹

B. Matters relating to the Standing Committee on Finance

(Agenda sub-item 11(b))

73. At the 1st meeting, the President invited the CMA to consider the annual report of the SCF⁵² and the recommendations on the second review of the functions of the SCF, which was on the agenda of the SBI.⁵³

74. On a proposal by the President, the CMA established a contact group on this matter, co-chaired by Clara Schultz (Sweden) and Ali Waqas Malik (Pakistan).

75. At its 11th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [8/CMA.6](#), entitled “Matters relating to the Standing Committee on Finance”.

76. The President informed the CMA that the SBI had agreed to continue consideration of the second review of the functions of the SCF at SBI 63 (November 2025).⁵⁴

C. Guidance to the Green Climate Fund

(Agenda sub-item 11(c))

77. At the 1st meeting, the President invited the CMA to provide guidance to the Green Climate Fund on its policies, programme priorities and eligibility criteria related to the funding for implementing the Paris Agreement, to be transmitted by the COP.

79. At its 11th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [9/CMA.6](#), entitled “Guidance to the Green Climate Fund”.

D. Guidance to the Global Environment Facility

(Agenda sub-item 11(d))

80. At the 1st meeting, the President invited the CMA to provide guidance on its policies, programme priorities and eligibility criteria related to the funding for implementing the Paris Agreement, to be transmitted by the COP.

81. On a proposal by the President, the CMA established a contact group on this matter, co-chaired by David Kaluba and Pierre Marc.

82. At its 11th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [10/CMA.6](#), entitled “Guidance to the Global Environment Facility”.

E. Report of the Fund for responding to Loss and Damage and guidance to the Fund

(Agenda sub-item 11(e))

83. At the 1st meeting, the President invited the CMA to consider the annual report of the Board of the Fund for responding to Loss and Damage.⁵⁵

84. On a proposal by the President, the CMA established a contact group on this matter, co-chaired by José Delgado (Austria) and Amena Yauvoli (Fiji).

85. At its 11th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [11/CMA.6](#), entitled “Report of the Fund for responding to Loss and Damage and guidance to the Fund”.

F. Arrangements between the Conference of the Parties, the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Paris Agreement and the Board of the Fund for responding to Loss and Damage

(Agenda sub-item 11(f))

86. At the 1st meeting, the President invited the CMA to consider the draft of the arrangements, developed by the SCF and approved by the Board of the Fund for responding to Loss and Damage, to be concluded between the CMA, the COP and the Board.⁵⁶

87. On a proposal by the President, the CMA established a contact group on this matter, co-chaired by José Delgado and Amena Yauvoli.

88. At its 11th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [12/CMA.6](#), entitled “Arrangements between the Conference of the Parties, the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Paris Agreement and the Board of the Fund for responding to Loss and Damage”.

G. Matters relating to the Adaptation Fund

(Agenda sub-item 11(g))

89. At the 1st meeting, the President invited the CMA to consider the annual report of the Adaptation Fund Board.⁵⁷

H. Sharm el-Sheikh dialogue on the scope of Article 2, paragraph 1(c), of the Paris Agreement and its complementarity with Article 9 of the Paris Agreement

(Agenda sub-item 11(h))

92. At the 1st meeting, the President invited the CMA to consider the annual report by the co-chairs on the Sharm el-Sheikh dialogue on the scope of Article 2, paragraph 1(c), of the Paris Agreement and its complementarity with Article 9 of the Paris Agreement.⁵⁸

93. The President thanked the co-chairs, Gabriela Blatter (Switzerland) and Mohammed Nasr (Egypt), for their work throughout 2024 in guiding the dialogue and preparing the report.

94. On a proposal by the President, the CMA established a contact group on this matter, co-chaired by Ben Abraham (New Zealand) and Elena Pereira (Honduras).

95. At its 11th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [14/CMA.6](#), entitled “Sharm el-Sheikh dialogue on the scope of Article 2, paragraph 1(c), of the Paris Agreement and its complementarity with Article 9 of the Paris Agreement”.

I. Report of developed country Parties on doubling the collective provision of climate finance for adaptation to developing country Parties from 2019 levels by 2025

(Agenda sub-item 11(i))

96. At the 1st meeting, the President invited the CMA to consider the report entitled “Doubling adaptation finance: efforts to respond to the call of the Glasgow Climate Pact”.⁵⁹

97. On a proposal by the President, the CMA established a contact group on this matter, co-chaired by Jens Fugl (Denmark) and Maria Luwalhati Tiuseco (Philippines).

98. At its 11th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [15/CMA.6](#), entitled “Report of developed country Parties on doubling the collective provision of climate finance for adaptation to developing country Parties from 2019 levels by 2025”.

J. United Arab Emirates dialogue on implementing the global stocktake outcomes referred to in paragraph 97 of decision 1/CMA.5

(Agenda sub-item 11(j))

99. At its 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agenda of the SBI.⁶⁰

100. At the resumed 5th meeting, the President informed the CMA that the SBI had forwarded this matter to the CMA for further consideration.⁶¹ The CMA agreed to further consider the matter.

101. The President invited Ricardo Marshall and Patrick Spicer to continue facilitating technical discussions on the matter.

103. Statements were made by six Parties, including four on behalf of groups of Parties.^{62, 63}

XII. Matters relating to technology development and transfer

(Agenda item 12)

A. Joint annual report of the Technology Executive Committee and the Climate Technology Centre and Network

(Agenda sub-item 12(a))

104. At its 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agendas of the SBSTA and the SBI.⁶⁴

105. At its 5th meeting, on a recommendation of the subsidiary bodies,⁶⁵ the CMA adopted decision [17/CMA.6](#), entitled “Enhancing climate technology development and transfer to support implementation of the Paris Agreement”.

B. Technology implementation programme

(Agenda sub-item 12(b))

106. At the 1st meeting, the President recalled that the CMA had invited SBI 61 to take into account the technology implementation programme in its consideration of the Poznan strategic programme on technology transfer.⁶⁶ The CMA noted that this matter was therefore to be first considered on the SBI agenda.⁶⁷

107. On a proposal by the President, the CMA established a contact group, co-chaired by Diann Black-Layne (Antigua and Barbuda) and Elfriede More (Austria), to further consider the matter after the SBI had concluded its consideration.

108. At its 11th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [18/CMA.6](#), entitled “Technology implementation programme”. One Party made a statement.⁶⁸

XIII. Matters relating to capacity-building

(Agenda item 13)

109. At its 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agenda of the SBI.⁶⁹

110. At its 5th meeting, on recommendations of the SBI,⁷⁰ the CMA adopted:

114. At its 11th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [22/CMA.6](#), entitled “Matters relating to the impacts of the implementation of response measures”.

XV. Matters relating to Article 6 of the Paris Agreement

(Agenda item 15)

A. Guidance on cooperative approaches referred to in Article 6, paragraph 2, of the Paris Agreement and in decision 2/CMA.3

(Agenda sub-item 15(a))

115. At its 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agenda of the SBSTA.⁷³

116. At the resumed 5th meeting, the President invited Maria AlJishi (Saudi Arabia) and Peer Stiansen (Norway) to co-facilitate discussions on this matter. In addition, the President invited Grace Fu (Singapore) and Simon Watts (New Zealand) to conduct ministerial consultations on, predominantly, the functionalities of the international registry under Article 6, paragraph 2, of the Paris Agreement.

117. At its 11th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [4/CMA.6](#), entitled “Matters relating to cooperative approaches referred to in Article 6, paragraph 2, of the Paris Agreement”.

B. Rules, modalities and procedures for the mechanism established by Article 6, paragraph 4, of the Paris Agreement and referred to in decision 3/CMA.3

(Agenda sub-item 15(b))

118. At the 1st meeting, the President invited the CMA to consider the annual reports of the Supervisory Body for the mechanism established by Article 6, paragraph 4, of the Paris Agreement for 2023 and 2024.⁷⁴

119. The President thanked Maria AlJishi and Martin Hession (Ireland), Chair and Vice-Chair of the Supervisory Body respectively, for their leadership and the members and alternate members of the Supervisory Body for their dedication, engagement and spirit of compromise throughout 2024. The President noted that the Supervisory Body engaged in extensive deliberations throughout 2024, concluding work on important elements for the full operationalization of the mechanism at the last meeting of the year in October. The President welcomed the positive momentum.

120. On a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [5/CMA.6](#), entitled “Guidance on the mechanism established by Article 6, paragraph 4, of the Paris Agreement”. A statement was made by a representative of one Party.⁷⁵

121. The CMA noted that matters relating to further guidance on the mechanism was on the agenda of the SBSTA.⁷⁶ On a proposal by the President, the CMA established a contact group, co-chaired by Kate Hancock (Australia) and Sonam Tashi (Bhutan), to continue consideration of the further guidance once the SBSTA had concluded its consideration. In addition, the President invited Grace Fu and Simon Watts to conduct ministerial consultations on, predominantly, the connection of Party registries to the registry for the mechanism.

122. At its resumed 11th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [6/CMA.6](#), entitled “Further guidance on the mechanism established by Article 6, paragraph 4, of the Paris Agreement”.

123. In addition, on a proposal by the President, the CMA elected members and alternate members to the Supervisory Body, as reflected in the annex.

C. Work programme under the framework for non-market approaches referred to in Article 6, paragraph 8, of the Paris Agreement and in decision 4/CMA.3

(Agenda sub-item 15(c))

124. At its 1st meeting, the CMA noted that this matter was on the agenda of the SBSTA.⁷⁷

125. At its 5th meeting, on a recommendation of the SBSTA,⁷⁸ the CMA adopted decision [7/CMA.6](#), entitled “Work programme under the framework for non-market approaches referred to in Article 6, paragraph 8, of the Paris Agreement and in decision [4/CMA.3](#)”.

126. 127. On a proposal by the President, the CMA agreed to conduct informal consultations co-facilitated by Paulette Bynoe (Guyana) and Arne Riedel (Germany) to consider the recommendations of the PAICC in its annual report and the timing of the first review of its modalities and procedures.

128. At its 11th meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMA adopted decision [23/CMA.6](#), entitled “Matters relating to the committee to facilitate implementation and promote compliance referred to in Article 15, paragraph 2, of the Paris Agreement”.

129. Noting that Parties discussed at this session the matters addressed in chapter II.B of the annual report of the PAICC, the CMA concluded that consideration of that chapter will continue at CMA 7.

130. In addition, on a proposal by the President, the CMA elected members and alternate members to the PAICC, as reflected in the annex.

XVII. Administrative, financial and institutional matters

(Agenda item 17)

131. At its 1st meeting, the CMA noted that these matters were on the agenda of the SBI.⁸⁰

132. At its 5th meeting, on a proposal by the President,⁸¹ the CMA endorsed:

(a) Decision [20/CP.29](#), entitled “Administrative, financial and institutional matters”;

(b) Decision [21/CP.29](#), entitled “Administrative, financial and institutional matters”.

XVIII. High-level segment

(Agenda item 18)⁸²

133. At the joint 2nd meeting of CMA 6, COP 29 and CMP 19, on 12 November, the President opened the high-level segment. The first part of the high-level segment continued at the joint 3rd meeting of CMA 6, COP 29 and CMP 19, on 13 November, while the second part was held on 19 and 20 November.⁸³

135. At its resumed 11th meeting, the CMA considered the draft report on the session⁸⁴ and, on a proposal by the President, authorized the Rapporteur to complete the report on the session under the guidance of the President and with the assistance of the secretariat.

136. The UNFCCC Deputy Executive Secretary informed the CMA that some decisions adopted at this session have financial and human resource implications beyond the provisions included in the budget for the biennium 2024–2025, noting that funding estimates and categorization of activities are preliminary and based on the information available at the time. Unless otherwise specified, all activities under the following items are categorized as temporary or short term:⁸⁵

(a) Under agenda item 8, “Reporting and review pursuant to Article 13 of the Paris Agreement: provision of financial and technical support to developing country Parties for reporting and capacity-building”, EUR 81,000 will be required in 2025;

(b) Under agenda sub-item 9(a), “Global goal on adaptation”, EUR 349,000 will be required in 2025;

(c) Under agenda sub-item 11(a), “New collective quantified goal on climate finance”, EUR 648,000 will be required in 2025;

(d) Under agenda item 14, “Report of the forum on the impact of the implementation of response measures”, EUR 29,000 will be required in 2025. The estimated amount will be covered from existing resources;

(e) Under agenda sub-item 15(a), “Guidance on cooperative approaches referred to in Article 6, paragraph 2, of the Paris Agreement and in decision [2/CMA.3](#)”, EUR 450,000 will be required in 2025;

(f) Under agenda sub-item 15(c), “Work programme under the framework for non-market approaches referred to in Article 6, paragraph 8, of the Paris Agreement and in decision [4/CMA.3](#)”, EUR 57,000 will be required in 2025.

137. At its 11th meeting, on a proposal by Brazil, the CMA adopted resolution [1/CMA.6](#), entitled “Expression of gratitude to the Government of the Republic of Azerbaijan and the people of the city of Baku”.

138. At the joint 12th meeting of CMA 6, COP 29 and CMP 19, on 24 November, representatives of Parties, groups of Parties and observer organizations made closing statements.⁸⁶

139. The President expressed gratitude to Parties for their hard work during this session.

140. The President then declared CMA 6 closed.
