## Climate Change Kiosk

Located in the exhibit area on Level 2, the Climate Change Kiosk (CCKIOSK) is staffed daily between 9 a.m. and 7 p.m. The Climate Change Kiosk's primary goal is to provide information about the climate change process and the secretariat.

- Rio conventions at the Kiosk** A special feature at this conference is the three “pillars of action” displaying publications from the other Rio conventions, the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD) and the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification (UNCCD).
- Rio conventions calendar** Participants are invited to pick up their copy of the 2006 CBD/UNCCD/UNFCCC calendar. This year's joint calendar takes into account the 2006 International Year of Deserts and Desertification (IYDD) of UNCCD and attempts to show some of the vulnerability of people and ecosystems in arid and semi-arid areas as well as elsewhere in North America, Latin America, Asia, Africa and Australia.
- Michael Martin at the Kiosk** The photographer Michael Martin, who took the photographs for this year's calendar, will be coming from Germany for a special "vernissage" on 7 December at the Kiosk.
- Key GHG data** “Key GHG Data” is the first UNFCCC publication to cover all greenhouse gas data officially submitted by developed and developing Parties under the UNFCCC. This new publication includes greenhouse gas data from 40 developed countries and 121 developing countries, presented in a reader-friendly format.
- Climate Talk Series** The Climate Talk Series at the Kiosk is a theme-based series of 15-minute presentations by intergovernmental organizations, NGOs, business, industry and Governments. The theme at this conference is “Time for action”. Invited speakers share examples of climate action at the individual, organizational, local, municipal and other levels.
