## Climate Change Kiosk

Located in the exhibit area on Level 2, the Climate Change Kiosk (CCKIOSK) is staffed daily between 9 a.m. and 7 p.m. The Climate Change Kiosk's primary goal is to provide information about the climate change process and the secretariat.

### **Carbon neutral conference strategy and offset of computer -generated emissions**

The Montreal 2005 United Nations Climate Change Conference will be carbon neutral thanks to renewable **Wind Power by Pembina**.

More than 2,300 media and delegates to the conference are receiving enough wind power to offset the greenhouse gas emissions from the energy used by their laptop computers for one full year. In addition, 500 desktop computers will be offset by **Wind Power by Pembina** for the duration of the conference to help ensure that the conference is carbon neutral. Wind-powered computer stickers will be distributed to delegates for them to affix to their own computers back home.

### **“Kyoto-Meter”**

From 6 to 8 December WWF invites ministers to try the "Kyoto-Meter". This is similar to a fairground strength-o-meter, where participants use a hammer to send the jack higher to ring the bell. In WWF's "Kyoto-Meter" any type of hit will result in a conservation win. The meter will show participants saving fish, glaciers and polar bears from the harmful effects of climate change.

### **Outside exhibits**

A series of exhibits by environmental NGOs may be viewed in front of the Palais des congrès on Place Riopelle. These include artistic displays relating to climate change from organizations such as Greenpeace, Équiterre and Friends of the Earth.
