Submission by China, India, Malaysia, Philippines, and Thailand

Equity

Parties decide that a global goal for substantially reducing global emissions by 2050, referred to in paragraph 5 of Decision 1/CP.16, shall be achieved by Parties on the basis of equity and in accordance with their common but differentiated responsibilities and respective capabilities. Accordingly, equity shall be reflected by having a fair sharing and equitable allocation framework wherein developed country Parties take the lead in undertaking deep binding emission reductions in the short-, mid- and long-term that reflect their historical and current responsibility for global emissions and in providing finance, technology and capacity building to developing countries, consistent with their commitments under the UNFCCC. Developing country Parties' equitable contributions to the achievement of such global goal shall take into account their specific needs and circumstances, ensure access to their sustainable development and improvements in living standards in the context of climate change, and be commensurate to the extent to which support for their mitigation and adaptation actions are provided by developed country Parties consistent with Art. 4.7 of the UNFCCC.
