## Submission by Australia, Canada and Japan on the Long Term Financing

- 1. Reaffirms that, in accordance with the relevant provisions of the Convention, scaled-up, new and additional, predictable and adequate funding shall be provided to developing country Parties, taking into account the urgent and immediate needs of developing countries that are particularly vulnerable to the adverse effects of climate change;
- 2. Recognizes that developed country Parties commit, in the context of meaningful mitigation actions and transparency on implementation, to a goal of mobilizing jointly USD100 billion per year by 2020 to address the needs of developing countries;
- 3. Reaffirms that, in accordance with paragraph 1(e) of the Bali Action Plan, funds provided to developing country Parties may come from a wide variety of sources, public and private, bilateral and multilateral, including alternative sources;
- 4. Recognizes that each Party determines the mode and source of its contributions in support of the goal of mobilizing \$100 billion referenced in paragraph 2;
- 5. Reaffirms that a significant share of new multilateral funding for adaptation should flow through the Green Climate Fund;
- 6. Emphasizes the importance of continuing to provide ongoing support beyond 2012 to address the urgent and immediate needs of developing countries that are particularly vulnerable to the adverse effects of climate change, such as LDC's, SIDS and Africa;
- 7. Takes note of the relevant reports on the financing needs and options for the mobilization of resources to address the needs of developing country Parties with regard to climate change adaptation and mitigation, including the report of the High-level Advisory Group on Climate Change Financing;
