## **I. Opening of the session**

(Agenda item 1)

1. The twelfth session of the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Kyoto Protocol (CMP), convened pursuant to Article 13, paragraph 6, of the Kyoto Protocol, was opened in Bab Ighli, Marrakech, Morocco, on 7 November 2016 by Mr. Salaheddine Mezouar, President of CMP 12.<sup>1</sup>

## **II. Organizational matters**

(Agenda item 2)

### **A. Adoption of the agenda**

(Agenda sub-item 2(a))

2. At its 1<sup>st</sup> meeting,<sup>2</sup> on 7 November, the CMP considered a note by the Executive Secretary containing the provisional agenda and annotations.<sup>3</sup> The provisional agenda was prepared in agreement with the President of CMP 11, after consultation with the Bureau of the CMP.

3. Following the proposal of the President of CMP 12, the CMP adopted the agenda as follows:

**B. Election of replacement officers**

(Agenda sub-item 2(b))

4. The CMP considered this item at its 1<sup>st</sup> meeting as well as at its 10<sup>th</sup> meeting, on 18 November. No election of replacement officers was required.<sup>6</sup>

**C. Organization of work, including for the sessions of the subsidiary bodies**

(Agenda sub-item 2(c))

5. At the 1<sup>st</sup> meeting, the President referred the CMP to the annotations to the provisional agenda.<sup>7</sup> He noted that the Subsidiary Body for Scientific and Technological Advice (SBSTA) and the Subsidiary Body for Implementation (SBI) would develop draft decisions and conclusions for consideration by the CMP, and that it was imperative that the SBSTA and the SBI conclude their work as scheduled, on Monday, 14 November.

6. On a proposal by the President, the CMP decided to refer the following agenda items to the subsidiary bodies:

7. With regard to agenda item 14, “High-level segment”, the President informed the CMP that the arrangements would follow the approach outlined at the 1<sup>st</sup> meeting of the Conference of the Parties (COP) at its twenty-second session.<sup>8</sup>

8. The President reminded Parties<sup>9</sup> that negotiations must conclude by Wednesday, 16 November, and that the CMP would convene on Thursday, 17 November, to consider the draft decisions and conclusions ready for consideration and adoption at that time and on Friday, 18 November, to complete its work.

9. The CMP agreed to proceed on the basis of the proposals made by the President.

10. At the joint 2<sup>nd</sup> meeting of the COP and the CMP, on 8 November, general statements were made by representatives of Thailand (on behalf of the Group of 77 and

China), Slovakia and the European Commission (on behalf of the European Union and its member States), Switzerland (on behalf of the Environmental Integrity Group), Australia (on behalf of the Umbrella Group), Mali (on behalf of the African Group), Maldives (on behalf of the Alliance of Small Island States), the Democratic Republic of the Congo (on behalf of the least developed countries), Saudi Arabia (on behalf of the Arab Group), the Plurinational State of Bolivia (on behalf of the Like-minded Developing Countries), Nicaragua (on behalf of the Central American Integration System), the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela (on behalf of the Bolivarian Alliance for the Peoples of Our America – Peoples’ Trade Treaty), South Africa (on behalf of Brazil, China, India and South Africa (the BASIC countries)), Costa Rica (on behalf of the Independent Association for Latin America and the Caribbean), the Russian Federation, Oman and the State of Palestine.

11. At the same joint meeting, statements were made by representatives of seven non-governmental organization (NGO) constituencies (trade unions, women and gender, youth, business and industry, farmers, indigenous peoples, and environmental).

12. During the session, the President convened an informal stocktaking plenary on 12 November in order to enhance the openness, inclusiveness and transparency of the negotiations and to provide an overview to all participants of the organization of work, of the steps being taken and of how the negotiations were advancing.<sup>10</sup>

#### **D. Approval of the report on credentials**

(Agenda sub-item 2(d))

13. At the 10<sup>th</sup> meeting, the President recalled that the CMP, by decision 36/CMP.1, decided that credentials from Parties to the Kyoto Protocol would apply for the participation of their representatives in sessions of the COP and of the CMP, and that a single report on credentials would be submitted for approval, following established procedures, to the Bureau.

14. The President referred to the report on credentials,<sup>11</sup> which indicates that the Bureau, in accordance with rule 20 of the draft rules of procedure being applied, examined and approved the credentials of the representatives of Parties.

15. At the same meeting, the CMP, on the basis of the report of the Bureau and additional credentials provided by two Parties (Nauru and Ukraine), accepted the credentials of Parties attending the session. In addition, the secretariat received the credentials from Solomon Islands and Kuwait on 28 November and 15 December 2016, respectively.

#### **E. Status of ratification of the Doha Amendment to the Kyoto Protocol**

(Agenda sub-item 2(e))

16. At its 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting, on 9 November, the CMP considered the oral status report presented by the Deputy Executive Secretary on the instruments of acceptance of the Doha Amendment received by the Depositary.

17. The Deputy Executive Secretary recalled that, on 8 December 2012, CMP 8 adopted, in accordance with Articles 20 and 21 of the Kyoto Protocol, the Doha Amendment to the Kyoto Protocol.<sup>12</sup> He outlined that, on the basis of the current number of

Parties to the Kyoto Protocol (192), the Doha Amendment requires 144 instruments of acceptance in order to enter into force. He noted that, as at 8 November 2016, the Depositary had received instruments of acceptance of the Doha Amendment from 72 Parties. He urged all Parties to expedite their domestic procedures to ratify the Doha Amendment and to deposit their instruments of acceptance with the Depositary as soon as possible.

18. The President also urged Parties to deposit their instruments of acceptance of the Doha Amendment with the Depositary as soon as possible.

19. At the 9<sup>th</sup> meeting, on 17 November, the President stated that the Depositary had received an additional instrument of acceptance of the Doha Amendment: from Australia, on 9 November 2016. The President congratulated Australia for accepting the Doha Amendment and noted that the Amendment required an additional 71 instruments of acceptance in order to enter into force.

## **F. Attendance**

20. The session in Marrakech was attended by representatives of 189 Parties to the Kyoto Protocol, as well as representatives of 5 Parties to the Convention that are observers to the Kyoto Protocol, 1 observer State, 51 United Nations bodies and programmes, convention secretariats, specialized agencies and institutions, and related organizations of the United Nations system, as listed in annex I.

21. The session was also attended by representatives of 71 intergovernmental organizations (IGOs) and representatives of 870 NGOs, as listed in document FCCC/CP/2016/INF.3.

22. According to decision 36/CMP.1, the admission of organizations as observers as decided by the COP also applies to the CMP. Observer organizations newly admitted to the sessions of the COP and the CMP are listed in document FCCC/CP/2016/3.<sup>13</sup>

## **G. Documentation**

23. The documents before CMP 12 are available on the UNFCCC website.<sup>14</sup>

# **III. Reports of the subsidiary bodies**

(Agenda item 3)

## **A. Report of the Subsidiary Body for Scientific and Technological Advice**

(Agenda sub-item 3(a))

24. At the 9<sup>th</sup> meeting, the Chair of the SBSTA, Mr. Carlos Fuller (Belize), introduced the draft report on SBSTA 45 and gave an oral report on the results of SBSTA 44 and 45 pertaining to the CMP.

25. At the same meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMP took note of the report on SBSTA 44,<sup>15</sup> the draft report on SBSTA 45 and the oral report provided by the

Chair of the SBSTA. The President expressed his appreciation to Mr. Fuller for his skilful guidance of the work of the SBSTA.

26. At the same meeting, on a recommendation by the SBSTA, the CMP adopted the conclusion found in paragraphs 27–30 below, on methodological issues under the Kyoto Protocol.

27. The CMP took note of the work of the SBSTA, pursuant to decision 5/CMP.8, paragraphs 40 and 41, and the considerable work undertaken by Parties as contained in their submissions<sup>16</sup> and the technical paper on transboundary carbon capture and storage project activities.<sup>17</sup>

28. The CMP recognized the role of carbon dioxide capture and storage technology in addressing greenhouse gas emissions under the clean development mechanism (CDM).

29. The CMP took note that, to date, registration as a CDM project activity has not been requested by any activity under the modalities and procedures for carbon dioxide capture and storage in geological formations, notwithstanding the adoption of the relevant documents by the CDM Executive Board.<sup>18</sup>

30. The CMP decided to conclude the consideration of the eligibility under the CDM of project activities consisting of carbon dioxide capture and storage in geological formations that involve the transport of carbon dioxide from one country to another or geological storage sites that are in more than one country; and the establishment of a global reserve of certified emission reduction units for carbon dioxide capture and storage in geological formations.

## **B. Report of the Subsidiary Body for Implementation**

(Agenda sub-item 3(b))

31. At the 9<sup>th</sup> meeting, the Chair of the SBI, Mr. Tomasz Chruszczow (Poland), introduced the draft report on SBI 45 and gave an oral report on the results of SBI 44 and 45 pertaining to the CMP.

32. On a proposal by the President, the CMP took note of the report on SBI 44,<sup>19</sup> the draft report on SBI 45 and the oral report provided by the Chair of the SBI. The President expressed his appreciation to Mr. Chruszczow for his skilful guidance of the work of the SBI.

33. At the same meeting, on a recommendation by the SBI,<sup>20</sup> the CMP concluded its consideration of the views of Parties on privileges and immunities for individuals serving on constituted bodies established under the Kyoto Protocol.

## IV. Matters relating to the clean development mechanism

(Agenda item 4)

34. At the 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting, the President referred to document FCCC/KP/CMP/2016/4, containing the annual report to the CMP of the CDM Executive Board, which covers its activities in the period from 17 October 2015 to 17 September 2016.

35. At the invitation of the President, the Vice-Chair of the CDM Executive Board, Mr. Frank Wolke (Germany), reported to the CMP on the work of the Executive Board. He drew attention to the recommendations of the Executive Board to the CMP contained in document FCCC/KP/CMP/2016/4. The President thanked all the Executive Board members and alternate members for their hard work and acknowledged the achievements made in the past year.

36. On a proposal by the President, the CMP established a contact group co-chaired by Ms. Hlobisile Sikhosana-Shongwe (Swaziland) and Ms. Karoliina Anttonen (Finland).

37. At its 9<sup>th</sup> meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMP adopted decision 3/CMP.12, entitled "Guidance relating to the clean development mechanism".

38. At its 10<sup>th</sup> meeting, the CMP, on a proposal by the President, elected the following members and alternate members to the CDM Executive Board.<sup>21</sup>

## V. Matters relating to joint implementation

(Agenda item 5)

39. At the 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting, the President referred to document FCCC/KP/CMP/2016/5, containing the annual report to the CMP of the Joint Implementation Supervisory Committee (JISC), which covers its activities in the period from 1 October 2015 to 21 September 2016.

40. At the invitation of the President, the Chair of the JISC, Mr. Konrad Raeschke-Kessler (Germany), reported on the progress of the work of the JISC. He highlighted the recommendations of the JISC to be considered by the CMP. The President thanked all the members and alternate members of the JISC for their hard work over the past year.

41. On a proposal by the President, the CMP established a contact group co-chaired by Mr. Arthur Rolle (Bahamas) and Mr. Dimitar Nikov (France).
42. At its 9<sup>th</sup> meeting, the CMP adopted decision 4/CMP.12, entitled “Guidance on the implementation of Article 6 of the Kyoto Protocol”.
43. At the same meeting, the CMP, on a recommendation by the SBI,<sup>22</sup> also adopted decision 5/CMP.12, entitled “Review of the joint implementation guidelines”.
44. At the 10<sup>th</sup> meeting, the President noted that a number of nominations to the JISC were outstanding and urged the constituencies to continue consultations and submit the pending nominations to the Executive Secretary as soon as possible and by 31 January 2017 at the latest. Once the nominations are received, the members and alternate members will be deemed to have been elected at CMP 12, in accordance with established practice.
45. The CMP, on a proposal by the President, elected the following members and alternate members of the JISC.<sup>23</sup>

## **VI. Report of the Compliance Committee**

(Agenda item 6)

46. At the 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting, the President referred to document FCCC/KP/CMP/2016/3, containing the annual report to the CMP of the Compliance Committee, which covers its activities in the period from 8 September 2015 to 9 September 2016.
47. At the invitation of the President, the Co-Chairperson of the plenary of the Compliance Committee, Mr. Gerhard Loibl (Austria), provided an overview of the annual report to the CMP. The President thanked all the members and alternate members of the Committee for their hard work over the past year.
48. At the same meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMP took note of the report of the Compliance Committee, expressed its gratitude to the Parties that made contributions to the Trust Fund for Supplementary Activities to support the work of the

Compliance Committee and invited Parties to make contributions to that fund to support the work of the committee in the biennium 2018–2019.

49. On another proposal by the President, the CMP agreed to undertake consultations on the recommendations of the committee with respect to Ukraine, which were to be facilitated by Mr. Khalid Abuleif (Saudi Arabia), Vice-President of the COP 21/CMP 11 Bureau, and to report back to the CMP.

50. At its 10<sup>th</sup> meeting, on a proposal by the President, the CMP encouraged the efforts of Ukraine to formally demonstrate its compliance with its commitment under Article 3, paragraph 1, of the Kyoto Protocol for the first commitment period referred to in the report of the Compliance Committee and requested the secretariat to make, on an exceptional basis, the necessary arrangements to enable Ukraine to do so by CMP 13, taking into account the recommendations set out in chapter III.B of the report of the committee.

51. The CMP, on a proposal by the President, elected the following members and alternate members of the Compliance Committee.<sup>24</sup>

59. At its 9<sup>th</sup> meeting, on a recommendation by the SBI,<sup>26</sup> the CMP adopted decision 1/CMP.12, entitled “Third review of the Adaptation Fund”.

60. At the same meeting, the representative of one Party made a statement.

## **VIII. Report on the high-level ministerial round table on increased ambition of Kyoto Protocol commitments**

(Agenda item 8)

61. At the 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting the President referred to document FCCC/KP/CMP/2014/3, containing the report<sup>27</sup> on the high-level ministerial round table on increased ambition of Kyoto Protocol commitments, held on 5 June 2014.

62. At the invitation of the President, a representative of the CMP 11 Presidency reported on the outcome of the intersessional consultations on this matter.

63. The President underlined the need for an expedited entry into force of the Doha Amendment and emphasized the importance of ambitious emission reductions by Parties included in Annex with commitments for the second commitment period of the Kyoto Protocol.

64. A representative of one Party made a statement. In the light of the statement, the CMP agreed to a proposal by the President to undertake consultations facilitated by Mr. Ismail Chekkori (Morocco) and report back to the CMP.

65. At the 9<sup>th</sup> meeting, the President informed the CMP that the consultations did not result in an agreement. In accordance with rules 10(c) and 16 of the draft rules of procedure being applied, this matter will be included on the provisional agenda of CMP 13.

## **IX. Reporting from and review of Parties included in Annex I<sup>28</sup>**

(Agenda item 9)

### **A. National communications**

(Agenda sub-item 9(a))

66. At its 1<sup>st</sup> meeting, the CMP decided to refer this agenda sub-item to the SBI for consideration.

67. At its 9<sup>th</sup> meeting, the CMP took note of the status of submission and review of the reports from Parties included in Annex I.

### **B. Final compilation and accounting reports for the first commitment period for Annex B Parties under the Kyoto Protocol**

(Agenda sub-item 9(b))

68. At its 1<sup>st</sup> meeting, the CMP decided to refer this agenda sub-item to the SBI for consideration.

69. At its 9<sup>th</sup> meeting, on a recommendation by the SBI,<sup>29</sup> the CMP took note of the final compilation and accounting reports for the first commitment period for Annex B Parties under the Kyoto Protocol.<sup>30</sup>

70. At its 1<sup>st</sup> meeting, the CMP decided to refer this agenda sub-item to the SBI for its consideration.

71. At its 9<sup>th</sup> meeting, on a recommendation by the SBI,<sup>31</sup> the CMP took note of the annual compilation and accounting report for Annex B Parties under the Kyoto Protocol for 2016.<sup>32</sup>

72. At its 1<sup>st</sup> meeting, the CMP decided to refer this agenda item to the SBI for consideration.

73. At its 9<sup>th</sup> meeting, on a recommendation by the SBI,<sup>33</sup> the CMP adopted decision 6/CMP.12, entitled “Third comprehensive review of the implementation of the framework for capacity-building in developing countries under the Kyoto Protocol”.

75. At the 9<sup>th</sup> meeting, the President recalled that the SBSTA and SBI Chairs had reported that these issues were considered jointly under the agenda item “Impact of the implementation of response measures: improved forum and work programme”.

76. The CMP noted that Parties did not have specific conclusions on this matter and that the SBSTA and the SBI agreed to continue consideration thereof at the next session.<sup>34</sup>

79. At its 9<sup>th</sup> meeting, on a recommendation by the SBI, the CMP adopted the following decisions:

- (a) Decision 7/CMP.12, entitled “Financial and budgetary matters”;
- (b) Decision 8/CMP.12, entitled “Administrative, financial and institutional matters”.

## **XIV. High-level segment**

(Agenda item 14)

80. At the joint 4<sup>th</sup> meeting of the COP and the CMP and the 2<sup>nd</sup> meeting of the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Paris Agreement (CMA), on 15 November, the joint high-level segment of the three bodies was opened by the President.

81. Statements were made by Mohammed VI, King of Morocco, Mr. BAN Ki-moon, Secretary-General of the United Nations, Mr. Peter Thompson, President of the United Nations General Assembly, Ms. Patricia Espinosa, Executive Secretary of the UNFCCC, Ms. Marianne Mouhoub, a representative of the youth of Morocco, Ms. Laurene Powell Jobs, founder and President of the Emerson Collective, an organization that advocates for policies concerning the environment, education and other social justice initiatives, Mr. François Hollande, President of France, host country of COP 21/CMP 11.<sup>35</sup>

82. Following the adoption of the decisions on matters relating to the implementation of the Paris Agreement and preparations for the entry into force of the Paris Agreement and the first session of the CMA, a joint meeting of the COP, the CMP and the CMA was held in order to hear statements.

83. Statements were first made by the President and the Executive Secretary.

84. Statements were then made by representatives of Thailand (on behalf of the Group of 77 and China), Slovakia and the European Commission (on behalf of the European Union and its member States), Switzerland (on behalf of the Environmental Integrity Group), Australia (on behalf of the Umbrella Group), Maldives (on behalf of the Alliance of Small Island States), the Democratic Republic of Congo (on behalf of the least developed countries), Saudi Arabia (on behalf of the Arab Group), Nicaragua (on behalf of the Central American Integration System), the Plurinational State of Bolivia (on behalf of the Like-minded Developing Countries), Mali (on behalf of the African Group), Costa Rica (on behalf of the Independent Association for Latin America and the Caribbean), China, France, Argentina, India and Indonesia.

85. At the same joint meeting, statements were made by representatives of nine observer constituencies (indigenous peoples organizations, trade unions NGOs, women and gender NGOs, youth NGOs, business and industry NGOs, environmental NGOs, research and independent NGOs, and local government and municipal authorities).

#### **A. Statements by Parties**

(Agenda sub-item 14(a))

86. During the high-level segment, statements were made by 166 Parties to the Convention, of which 49 were given by Heads of State and Government, 5 by either Vice-Presidents or Deputy Prime Ministers, and 112 by ministers and representatives of Parties.<sup>36, 37, 38</sup>

#### **B. Statements by observer organizations**

(Agenda sub-item 14(b))

87. At the joint 8<sup>th</sup> meetings of the COP and the CMP and the 7<sup>th</sup> meeting of the CMA, on 17 November, statements were made by representatives of IGOs and NGOs.<sup>39</sup>

### **XV. Other matters**

(Agenda item 15)

88. At the 10<sup>th</sup> meeting, the President took up this agenda item. No issues were raised by Parties under this item.

At the resumed 10<sup>th</sup> meeting, on 18 November, a representative of the secretariat informed Parties that budgetary provisions had not been made for the session of the CMP in 2017 at the seat of the secretariat and that the secretariat was currently working on costing scenarios for convening COP 23/CMP 13/CMA 1.2, to be held in Bonn, Germany, based on the scale of the arrangements to be made.

### **A. Adoption of the report of the Conference of the Parties serving as the meeting of the Parties to the Kyoto Protocol on its twelfth session**

(Agenda sub-item 16(a))

90. At its resumed 10<sup>th</sup> meeting, the CMP considered the draft report on its twelfth session and, on a proposal by the President, authorized the Rapporteur to complete the report on the session, under the guidance of the President and with the assistance of the secretariat.

### **B. Closure of the session**

(Agenda sub-item 16(b))

91. At its resumed 10<sup>th</sup> meeting, on a proposal by Fiji, the CMP adopted resolution 1/CMP.12, entitled “Expression of gratitude to the Government of the Kingdom of Morocco and the people of Marrakech”.

92. The President then declared CMP 12 closed.
