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<u>Existing tools and methodologies for implementing capacity-building activities that enable</u> countries to achieve the long-term goals of the Paris Agreement.

Having the right and necessary tools and methodologies available to efficiently design, implement, and monitor and evaluate meaningful capacity-building interventions is key to making sure that countries successfully implement the Paris Agreement and reach its goals.

The PCCB seeks information on tools and methodologies used in climate-related efforts that aim to strengthen capacities at the individual, institutional or systemic level to meet objectives or perform better, and/or that enhance the sustainability, replicability or scalability of capacity-building projects/efforts. Relevant tools and methodologies also include those supporting the design and monitoring and evaluation of capacity-building efforts.

What are good examples of tools and methodologies used by different actors for implementing capacity-building activities that enable countries to achieve the long-term goals of the Paris Agreement?

• It is unlikely that we are able to achieve the set target of SDG goals & 1.5 deg.C. , if nothing is done to stop dumping waste and leaching chemical fertilizers into all our water ways. Policy makers need to be serious, to follow Sri Lanka Presidential order to ban all chemical fertilizers & pesticides importation by statutory legislations. All Cop26, need to follow the Sri Lanka footstep.

Which types of tools and methodologies for capacity building have proven to be the most effective and why?

• The public sectors policy and directives to respective agriculture ministry or departments need to be coherent for actions, based on the latest IPCC reports. The problem is most policy makers & signatories are ignoring the latest IPCC reports that humanity need to take actions to mitigate impacts of climate change.

Which (types of) tools and methodologies to support the efficient design, implementation, and monitoring/evaluation of meaningful capacity-building interventions are currently lacking?

• There is no lacking of any tools to push and execute the policy as needed for a 1.5deg C as laid out in the IPCC latest report for actions. All we need is for the respective signatories of Cop26 to legislate law to stop dumping wastes into our waterways, and also need to follow Sri Lanka legislations to ban all chemical inputs and pesticides into the respective countries.

In which thematic area(s) of the Paris Agreement are new tools and methodologies for capacity-building most required in order to achieve the long-term goals of the Paris Agreement?

• To achieve the long term goals, there is an urgent need to support the motion that ecocide be legislated as a crime against humanity under the Rome Statutes ICC legislation. France have legislated the ecocide law to protect and clean up the ecosystems. Our global biodiversity, and ecology are destroyed beyond natural restoration capacity. Unless signatories of Cop26 take serious actions to legislate legal actions for all polluters, based on polluters pay basis. The ICC Rome Statutes, 5th crime against humanity deserves a robust debate at the Cop26 conference too. But, it can be done under ICC jurisdiction too. Unless, we act our hope to achieve the set targets of 1.5deg. C & 17 SDG goals will remain a dream for humanity. Policy makers need to be serious at COP26 Glasgow conference for real executions of executive orders to act.
