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II. Annotations to the provisional agenda

1. Opening of the session

1. SBI 57 will be opened by the SBI Chair, Marianne Karlsen (Norway), on Sunday, 6 November 2022.

2. Organizational matters

(a) Adoption of the agenda

2. The provisional agenda, prepared by the Executive Secretary in agreement with the Chair, will be presented for adoption.

(b) Organization of the work of the session

3. SBI 57 will be held in parallel with SBSTA 57, COP 27, CMP 17 and CMA 4. Detailed information on the work at the session will be available on the session web page.³ Delegates are invited to refer to the overview schedule and the in-session Daily Programme⁴ and to regularly consult the closed-circuit television screens and the virtual conference platform for an up-to-date schedule of the work of the SBI. In order to maximize negotiation time and ensure timely closure of the session, presiding officers will propose, in consultation with Parties and in a transparent manner, time-saving approaches to the organization and scheduling of meetings during the session, taking into account previous relevant SBI conclusions.⁵ In this context, the Chairs of the subsidiary bodies will also propose cut-off times for group work and deadlines for the submission of conclusions so that they can be made available in all six official languages of the United Nations for the closing plenary of the subsidiary bodies.
4. The SBI Chair will issue, under her own responsibility, a scenario note in advance of the session that will suggest an approach and way forward for all items on the provisional agenda and provide guidance on working efficiently, effectively and transparently during the session.

(c) Election of officers other than the Chair

5. The SBI will be invited to elect its Vice-Chair and Rapporteur for 2023. When the SBI exercises its functions with regard to matters concerning the Kyoto Protocol, any member of its Bureau representing a Party to the Convention but, at that time, not a Party to the Kyoto Protocol shall be replaced by an additional member to be elected by and among the Parties to the Kyoto Protocol. This applies mutatis mutandis to the Paris Agreement.

August 2022. It will take the form of a workshop open to all Parties. Interested Parties can submit written questions in advance.

9. *Background:* The document prepared for SBI 57 covers the submission and review of the latest NCs and BRs from Annex I Parties received by the secretariat by the time of preparation of that document. SBI 56 agreed to defer consideration of this matter to SBI 57.⁸

10. *Action:* The SBI will be invited to take note of the status of submission and review of NCs and BRs.

(b) Compilations and syntheses of biennial reports from Parties included in Annex I to the Convention

11. *Background:* Consideration of the compilation and synthesis report on the information reported by Annex I Parties in their BR2s⁹ was initiated at SBI 45 and continued at subsequent sessions without any conclusions being reached. The secretariat prepared a compilation and synthesis report on the information reported by Annex I Parties in their BR3s¹⁰ and BR4s, including the latest submissions by Parties as at 13 May 2022. SBI 56 agreed to defer consideration of this matter to SBI 57.¹¹

12. *Action:* The SBI will be invited to conclude its consideration of this matter and to recommend a draft decision for consideration and adoption at COP 27.

(c) Reports on national greenhouse gas inventory data from Parties included in Annex I to the Convention

13. *Background:* The 2018 report on national greenhouse gas inventory data from Annex I Parties covers 1990–2016 and was considered at SBI 49, 50 and 51, while the 2019 report covering 1990–2017 was considered at SBI 51. The reports for 2020 and 2021 covering 1990–2018 and 1990–2019, respectively, were available for consideration at SBI 56, where it was agreed to defer consideration of this matter to SBI 57.¹² The report prepared for SBI 57 covers national greenhouse gas inventory data for 1990–2020.

14. *Action:* The SBI will be invited to take note of the information contained in those reports.

4. Reporting from Parties not included in Annex I to the Convention

(a) Information contained in national communications from Parties not included in Annex I to the Convention

15. *Background:* At SBI 24 some Parties proposed that, in accordance with Article 10, paragraph 2, of the Convention, the SBI consider the information communicated by non-Annex I Parties in all their NCs.¹³ There was no agreement among Parties at that session, and this agenda sub-item has since been held in abeyance.

16. *Action:* The SBI will be invited to provide guidance on how to consider the information contained in the NCs of non-Annex I Parties, taking into account decisions 1/CP.21, 1/CP.24 and 18/CMA.1.

(b) Report of the Consultative Group of Experts

17. *Background:* COP 26 adopted the revised terms of reference of the CGE,¹⁴ based on which, inter alia, the CGE shall develop at its first meeting in 2022 a work programme for 2022–2026.¹⁵

18. At its 7th meeting, held from 28 February to 1 March 2022, the CGE developed its work programme for 2022–2026, which includes priorities and key activities, and its 2022

workplan.¹⁶ In addition, the CGE revised its vision, mission and metrics to measure the progress as well as strategic priorities for 2020–2026.¹⁷

19. *Action:* The SBI will be invited to consider the progress report of the CGE on its work in 2022 and to provide guidance to the CGE as appropriate.

(c) Provision of financial and technical support

20. *Background:* Financial and technical support provided to developing countries to implement the existing measurement, reporting and verification arrangements under the Convention includes funding from the Global Environment Facility, which regularly reports on its activities relating to the preparation of NCs and BURs, the Capacity-building Initiative for Transparency, the Global Support Programme for Preparation of National Communications and Biennial Update Reports by non-Annex I Parties and technical support provided by the secretariat. SBI 56 agreed that consideration of this matter would continue at SBI 57.¹⁸

21. *Action:* The SBI will be invited to continue its consideration of this matter and to agree on any further action, as appropriate.

(d) Summary reports on the technical analysis of biennial update reports of Parties not included in Annex I to the Convention

22. *Background:* Twenty-three rounds of technical analysis covering 143 BURs will have been conducted as at 24 August 2022. The twenty-fourth round will be conducted from 29 August to 2 September 2022.

23. *Action:* The SBI will be invited to take note of the summary reports finalized by 26 August 2022.

5. Matters relating to the clean development mechanism registry referred to in paragraph 75(b) of the annex to decision 3/CMA.3

24. *Background:* CMP 16 requested SBI 56 to consider measures for implementing aspects relating to the CDM registry in decision 3/CMA.3 and to develop recommendations for consideration at CMP 17.¹⁹ SBI 56 initiated its consideration of matters referred to in paragraph 75(b) of the annex to decision 3/CMA.3 with respect to transfers of certified emission reductions from the CDM registry to the registry for the mechanism established by Article 6, paragraph 4, of the Paris Agreement in accordance with chapter VI of the annex to decision 3/CMA.3.²⁰

25. The SBI requested the secretariat to prepare a technical paper²¹ with the aim of furthering Parties' understanding of the technical and process-related aspects for transfers of eligible certified emission reductions from the CDM registry to the Article 6, paragraph 4, mechanism registry in accordance with paragraph 75(b) of the annex to decision 3/CMA.3, focusing on the implications for the CDM registry, for consideration at SBI 57.²²

26. *Action:* The SBI will be invited to conclude its consideration of this matter with a view to recommending a draft decision for consideration and adoption at CMP 17.

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6. Report of the administrator of the international transaction log under the Kyoto Protocol

27. *Background:* CMP 1 requested the SBI to consider annual reports of the international transaction log administrator with a view to the SBI requesting the CMP to provide guidance in relation to the operation of registry systems.²³

28. *Action:* The SBI will be invited to take note of the 2022 report of the international transaction log administrator.

7. Matters relating to the work programme for urgently scaling up mitigation ambition and implementation referred to in paragraph 27 of decision 1/CMA.3*

29. *Background:* CMA 3 established a work programme to urgently scale up mitigation ambition and implementation in this critical decade and requested the SBI and the SBSTA to recommend a draft decision for consideration and adoption at CMA 4 in a manner that complements the global stocktake.²⁴ SBI 56 and SBSTA 56 initiated their consideration of this matter, and invited Parties to submit their views on the work programme by 30 September 2022.²⁵

30. The SBI and the SBSTA requested the secretariat to organize, under the guidance of their Chairs, a pre-session workshop on the work programme referred to in paragraph 29 above, open to all Parties, prior to CMA 4.²⁶

31. *Action:* The SBI and the SBSTA will be invited to continue their consideration of this matter with a view to recommending a draft decision for consideration and adoption at CMA 4.

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8. Matters relating to the global stocktake under the Paris Agreement*

32. *Background:* Article 14 of the Paris Agreement provides that the CMA shall periodically take stock of the implementation of the Paris Agreement to assess collective progress towards achieving its purpose and long-term goals, referred to as the global stocktake. CMA 3 welcomed the start of the first global stocktake,²⁷ which is being conducted with the assistance of the SBI and the SBSTA.

33. The global stocktake consists of three components: information collection and preparation, which commenced at SB 52–55; technical assessment, which started at SB 56 and will conclude at SB 58; and consideration of outputs, which will take place at CMA 5.²⁸

34. The technical assessment component consists of a joint contact group of the SBI and the SBSTA and a technical dialogue. At SB 56, the joint contact group met for the first time, and the first meeting of the technical dialogue was held,²⁹ for which the co-facilitators are preparing a summary report that will be made available on the technical dialogue web page.³⁰

35. The joint contact group will meet again at SB 57, and the second meeting of the technical dialogue will be held.

36. *Action:* The SBI and the SBSTA will be invited to continue their consideration of this matter and to determine further action, as appropriate. Parties and non-Party stakeholders are invited to actively participate in the second meeting of the technical dialogue.

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9. Second periodic review of the long-term global goal under the Convention and of overall progress towards achieving it*

37. *Background:* COP 25 decided that the second periodic review of the long-term global goal and of overall progress towards achieving it shall start in the second half of 2020 and conclude in 2022, with the structured expert dialogue held in conjunction with sessions of the subsidiary bodies.³¹

38. The third meeting of SED2 was held in conjunction with SB 56. The SBI and the SBSTA requested the co-facilitators of SED2, with the assistance of the secretariat, to prepare a summary report on the meeting by 26 August 2022,³² and to prepare in a timely fashion³³ a

synthesis report on the meetings of SED2, which covers in a balanced manner the two themes of the second periodic review and reflects the dialogue, for consideration at SB 57.³⁴

39. Parties are invited to submit, by 14 October 2022, their reflections on the findings of SED2 and their views on the elements of the conclusions of the joint contact group to be convened at SB 57 to consider this matter.³⁵

40. *Action:* The SBI and the SBSTA will be invited to conclude their consideration of this matter and recommend a draft decision on the second periodic review for consideration and adoption at COP 27.

10. Koronivia joint work on agriculture*

41. *Background:* COP 23 requested the SBI and the SBSTA to jointly address issues related to agriculture, including through workshops and expert meetings, by working with constituted bodies under the Convention and taking into consideration the vulnerabilities of agriculture to climate change and approaches to addressing food security, and to report to the COP on the progress and outcomes of this work.³⁶

42. At SB 56, the SBI and the SBSTA continued their joint work on addressing issues related to agriculture and considered the reports on the two parts of the intersessional workshop held in 2021.³⁷ They agreed to continue consideration of this matter at SB 57, taking into account the informal note prepared by co-facilitators for this agenda item under their own responsibility,³⁸ noting that the informal note does not reflect consensus or all options that may be considered by Parties.³⁹

43. *Action:* The SBI and the SBSTA will be invited to conclude consideration of this matter with a view to recommending a draft decision for consideration and adoption at COP 27.

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11. Report of the Adaptation Committee*

44. *Background:* COP 17 requested the AC to report annually to the COP through the subsidiary bodies.⁴⁰ CMA 1 decided that the AC shall serve the Paris Agreement.⁴¹

45. The 21st regular meeting of the AC took place from 28 to 31 March 2022 and the 22nd from 6 to 9 September, both in Bonn. The 2022 report of the AC reflects the outcomes of those meetings and of intersessional work of the AC as per its flexible workplan for 2022–2024.⁴²

46. CMA 1 requested⁴³ the AC to develop, with the engagement of IPCC Working Group II, using relevant existing guidance as a starting point, as appropriate, by June 2022, draft supplementary guidance for voluntary use by Parties in communicating information in accordance with the elements contained in the annex to decision 9/CMA.1 for consideration at SB 57 in the context of consideration of the AC report. The draft supplementary guidance will be in addendum 1 to the 2022 AC report.

47. *Action:* The SBI and the SBSTA will be invited to consider the 2022 AC report and to recommend draft conclusions and/or a draft decision resulting from the implementation of the workplan of the AC in 2022 for consideration and adoption at COP 27 and CMA 4.

12. Matters relating to the least developed countries

48. *Background:* The LEG is mandated to develop a two-year rolling programme of work for consideration by the SBI at its first session of each year and to report on its work to the SBI at each of its sessions.⁴⁴

49. The most recent NAP Expo was held in Botswana from 22 to 26 August 2022. SBI 56 requested the LEG to continue to take advantage of the NAP Expos as a platform for mobilizing a wide range of agencies and organizations, as well as UNFCCC constituted bodies, including those involved in relevant programmes and networks, to undertake activities to address priority needs of the least developed countries.⁴⁵ The 42nd meeting of the LEG will be held back-to-back with NAP Expo, from 29 to 31 August 2022, in Gaborone, Botswana.

50. The LEG is to develop its draft rules of procedure, taking into account its current practices and terms of reference, for consideration and adoption at COP 27 and CMA 4.⁴⁶ SBI 56 noted the progress of the LEG in drafting its rules of procedure.⁴⁷

51. *Action:* The SBI will be invited to consider the work of the LEG and to take further action, as appropriate.

13. National adaptation plans

52. *Background:* COP 25 requested the SBI to discuss information from the reports of the AC and the LEG, including on gaps and needs and the implementation of national adaptation plans, and to take further action, as appropriate.⁴⁸ At SBI 52–55 consideration of such information was initiated, and the SBI agreed to continue consideration at SBI 56 on the basis

53. SBI 56 agreed that consideration would continue at SBI 57 on the basis of the draft text elements prepared by the co-facilitators for this agenda item at SBI 52–55⁵¹ and referred to in paragraph 52 above.

14. Glasgow–Sharm el-Sheikh work programme on the global goal on adaptation referred to in decision 7/CMA.3*

55. *Background:* CMA 3 established and launched the comprehensive two-year Glasgow–Sharm el-Sheikh work programme on the global goal on adaptation, to be carried out jointly by the SBI and the SBSTA.⁵²

56. The SBI and the SBSTA welcomed the events convened at SB 56 under the Glasgow–Sharm el-Sheikh work programme on the global goal on adaptation,⁵³ and invited Parties and observers to submit views on the subsequent workshops,⁵⁴ including on general considerations, the topics for discussion under the themes identified in the compilation and synthesis of submissions, areas of work, expected outcomes, examples, case studies and modalities, for each workshop to be conducted in 2022, at least three weeks in advance of the workshop.⁵⁵

57. The SBI and SBSTA Chairs will prepare a concept note and guiding questions relating to the theme and areas of work of each workshop and on the basis of the received submissions. These, along with logistical information on the workshops, will be available on the work programme web page.⁵⁶

58. In the context of preparing a single annual report to be considered at SB 57, the secretariat will prepare under the guidance of the Chairs a summary of each workshop to capture progress and inform subsequent consideration by Parties under the Glasgow–Sharm el-Sheikh work programme.⁵⁷ The summaries will also be available on the work programme web page.⁵⁸

59. *Action:* The SBI and the SBSTA will be invited to consider the annual report on this matter with a view to reporting to CMA 4 on progress in implementing the work programme.

15. Report of the Executive Committee of the Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts*

60. *Background:* COP 19 and 20 requested the Executive Committee to report annually to the COP through the subsidiary bodies and to make recommendations, as appropriate.⁵⁹ Article 8, paragraph 2, of the Paris Agreement provides that the Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts shall be subject to the authority and guidance of the CMA.

61. The Executive Committee held its 15th and 16th meetings in Bonn, from 5 to 8 April 2022 and from 6 to 8 July 2022, respectively, and will convene its 17th meeting from 20 to 23 September 2022. In addition, all five expert groups and a cross-expert group held meetings.

62. The 2022 report of the Executive Committee highlights the Committee's progress in implementing its five-year rolling workplan, including through its expert groups, and contains a new five-year rolling workplan and recommendations thereon.

63. Organizations, bodies, networks and experts engaged in providing technical assistance to developing countries through the Santiago network for averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage associated with the adverse effects of climate change were invited to report on their progress to the Executive Committee, and the Executive Committee was requested to include relevant information from such reports in its annual reports.⁶⁰

64. *Action:* The SBI and the SBSTA will be invited to consider the 2022 report of the Executive Committee and recommend a draft decision to the appropriate body or bodies.

16. Matters relating to the Santiago network under the Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts*

65. *Background:* The Santiago network was established under the Warsaw International Mechanism to catalyse the provision of technical assistance by relevant organizations, bodies, networks and experts for the implementation of relevant approaches at the local, national and regional level in developing countries that are particularly vulnerable to the adverse effects of climate change.⁶¹

66. SBI 56 and SBSTA 56 initiated their consideration of institutional arrangements of the Santiago network⁶² and agreed consideration of the matter would continue at SB 57, taking into account the document prepared at those sessions.⁶³

67. *Action:* The SBI and the SBSTA will be invited to conclude their consideration of this matter and to recommend a draft decision for consideration and adoption by the appropriate governing body or bodies.⁶⁴

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17. Development and transfer of technologies and implementation of the Technology Mechanism

(a) Joint annual report of the Technology Executive Committee and the Climate Technology Centre and Network*

68. *Background:* The TEC and the CTCN prepare and submit a joint annual report to the COP and the CMA,⁶⁵ through the subsidiary bodies, on their respective activities and the performance of their respective functions.

69. In 2022, the TEC and the Advisory Board of the CTCN convened two meetings each, including the organization of two joint sessions, to advance the implementation of the joint activities and their workplans and programmes of work.

70. *Action:* The SBI and the SBSTA will be invited to consider the joint annual reports of the TEC and the CTCN for 2022 and to recommend a draft decision to COP 27 and CMA 4.

71. *Background:* COP 24 requested the SBI to take stock of progress in strengthening the linkages between the Technology Mechanism and the Financial Mechanism.⁶⁶ SBI 56 was not able to agree on conclusions on this matter. In accordance with rules 10(c) and 16 of the draft rules of procedure being applied, the matter has been included in the provisional agenda for SBI 57.⁶⁷

72. *Action:* The SBI will be invited to continue its consideration of this matter with a view to recommending a draft decision for consideration and adoption at COP 27.

(c) First periodic assessment referred to in paragraph 69 of decision 1/CP.21

73. *Background:* CMA 3 initiated the first periodic assessment of the effectiveness and adequacy of the support provided to the Technology Mechanism in supporting the implementation of the Paris Agreement on matters relating to technology development and transfer in accordance with the scope and modalities contained in the annex to decision 16/CMA.1 with a view to completing it at CMA 4.⁶⁸

74. SBI 56 considered⁶⁹ an interim report on the effectiveness and adequacy of the support provided to the Technology Mechanism in supporting the implementation of the Paris Agreement on matters relating to technology development and transfer and requested the secretariat to consider, as part of the elements of the scope of and modalities for the periodic assessment,⁷⁰ Parties' deliberations at that session⁷¹ in preparing the final report on the matter at SBI 57.⁷²

75. *Action:* The SBI will be invited to consider the final report and to provide recommendations to the CMA for improving effectiveness and enhancing support to the Technology Mechanism in supporting the implementation of the Paris Agreement and on updating the technology framework, as appropriate.

76. *Background:* SBI 34 invited the Global Environment Facility to provide reports on progress in carrying out its activities under the Poznan strategic programme on technology transfer for consideration by the SBI at its sessions for the duration of the programme.⁷³

77. SBI 56 requested the secretariat to prepare an information note with updated information on the status and successes of, challenges in and lessons learned from projects undertaken through the regional climate technology transfer and finance centres, for consideration at SBI 57.⁷⁴

78. *Action:* The SBI will be invited to consider the documents prepared for the session with a view to determining further action, as appropriate.

18. Matters relating to the Adaptation Fund

(a) Membership of the Adaptation Fund Board

79. *Background:* CMP 16 confirmed that Parties to the Paris Agreement are eligible for membership on the Adaptation Fund Board and requested the Adaptation Fund Board to amend the relevant procedures and modalities. It also requested the SBI to continue its consideration of matters relating to membership of the Adaptation Fund Board further to decision 1/CMP.14, paragraph 5, and to forward a recommendation for consideration at CMP 17.⁷⁵

80. SBI 56 was not able to agree on conclusions on this matter. In accordance with rules 10(c) and 16 of the draft rules of procedure being applied, the matter has been included in the provisional agenda for SBI 57.⁷⁶

81. *Action:* The SBI will be invited to continue its consideration of this matter and to forward a recommendation to CMP 17.

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(b) Fourth review of the Adaptation Fund

82. *Background:* SBI 56 initiated its consideration of the fourth review of the Adaptation Fund in accordance with the annex to decision 4/CMP.16 and in line with the mandate of the Adaptation Fund as reflected in relevant decisions of the CMP.⁷⁷

83. It welcomed the submissions on the matter received before and during SBI 56 from Parties to the Kyoto Protocol, Parties to the Paris Agreement, observer organizations, other interested international organizations, stakeholders and non-governmental organizations involved in the activities of the Adaptation Fund and implementing entities accredited by the Adaptation Fund Board.⁷⁸

84. The secretariat will prepare, in collaboration with the Adaptation Fund Board secretariat, a technical paper on the fourth review of the Adaptation Fund, in accordance with the terms of reference for the review,⁷⁹ taking into account the deliberations and conclusions of SBI 56 and the submissions referred to in paragraph 83 above, for consideration at SBI 57.⁸⁰

85. *Action:* The SBI will be invited to complete its consideration of this matter while welcoming the participation of Parties to the Paris Agreement, with a view to recommending a draft decision on the matter for consideration and adoption at CMP 17.

19. Matters relating to capacity-building

86. *Background:* The PCCB held its 6th meeting in conjunction with SBI 56 with a focus on matters relating to the implementation of its workplan for 2021–2024. The 11th Durban Forum on capacity-building was also held in conjunction with SBI 56.

87. COP 24 requested the SBI to thematically align meetings of the Durban Forum with the annual focus area of the PCCB,⁸¹ which for 2022 is building capacity to facilitate coherent implementation of nationally determined contributions in the context of national development plans and sustainable recovery.

88. The PCCB prepared an annual technical progress report on its work in 2022.⁸²

89. *Action:* The SBI will be invited to consider the annual technical progress report of the PCCB for 2022 and to recommend a draft decision to COP 27 and CMA 4.

20. Matters relating to the forum on the impact of the implementation of response measures serving the Convention, the Kyoto Protocol and the Paris Agreement*

90. *Background:* SBI 56 and SBSTA 56 continued their consideration of the first annual report of the KCI for 2019 and initiated their consideration of several matters, including the midterm review of the workplan of the forum. They took note of the informal note⁸³ prepared at SB 56 by the co-chairs of the forum on the midterm review, recognizing that the content of the note does not represent consensus among Parties.⁸⁴

91. The SBI and the SBSTA requested the secretariat to organize a regional workshop on activity 3 of the workplan before SB 57, in collaboration with relevant organizations and stakeholders, to address regional needs and acknowledge the work that is being carried out by the KCI, and noted that further regional workshops on activity 3 could be decided on by the forum.⁸⁵ Information about the regional workshop is available on the UNFCCC website.⁸⁶

92. The KCI held its 6th meeting in conjunction with SB 56 and will hold its 7th meeting in conjunction with SBI 57. The forum, in accordance with its modalities,⁸⁷ will consider the annual report of the KCI with a view to making recommendations to the COP, the CMP and the CMA.

93. *Action:* The SBI and the SBSTA will be invited to continue their consideration of the matters referred to in paragraph 90 above, and to convene the forum in order to implement agreed workplan activities.

21. Gender and climate change

94. *Background:* COP 25 adopted the enhanced five-year Lima work programme on gender and its gender action plan and decided that an intermediate review of the progress of implementation of the activities contained in the gender action plan will be conducted at SBI 56.⁸⁸ The SBI initiated its consideration of this matter at SBI 56 and agreed to continue it at SBI 57.⁸⁹

95. As per activity A.4 of the gender action plan, the secretariat will invite Parties, relevant organizations, the research community and the IPCC to participate in an SBI–SBSTA special event to present relevant information upon publication of the IPCC Sixth Assessment Report.⁹⁰

96. *Action:* The SBI will be invited to conclude its consideration of the intermediate review of the gender action plan, taking note of the informal notes prepared by the co-facilitators for this agenda item at SB 56 under their own responsibility,⁹¹ with a view to recommending a draft decision thereon for consideration and adoption at COP 27.

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22. Matters relating to Action for Climate Empowerment

97. *Background:* COP 26 and CMA 3 adopted the Glasgow work programme on ACE and requested SBI 56 to develop an action plan focusing on immediate action through short-term, clear and time-bound activities, guided by the priority areas set out in the work programme.⁹² The SBI initiated its work on this matter at SBI 56 and agreed to continue consideration of this matter at SBI 57.⁹³

98. The 2022 ACE Dialogue, held in conjunction with SBI 56, focused on engaging children and youth in implementing action in the four priority areas of the Glasgow work programme. SBI 56 requested the secretariat to include information on the 2022 Dialogue in the annual summary report on progress in implementing activities under the Glasgow work programme.⁹⁴

99. *Action:* The SBI will be invited to consider the documents prepared for the session and to continue to develop the action plan, taking into account the informal note prepared by the co-facilitators for this agenda item at SBI 56,⁹⁵ with a view to recommending a draft decision for consideration and adoption at COP 27 and CMA 4.
