(b) Election of officers other than the Chair

3. *Background:* At the request of the President of COP 28, consultations on nominations for SBSTA Vice-Chair and Rapporteur were initiated at SB 60 with the Chairs and coordinators of the regional groups and constituencies, who were informed that the deadline for the submission of nominations is 16 November 2024. Parties are invited to recall decision [3/CP.23](#) and actively consider nominating women.

4. When the SBSTA exercises its functions with regard to matters concerning the Kyoto Protocol, any member of its Bureau representing a State that is a Party to the Convention but, at that time, not a Party to the Kyoto Protocol shall be replaced by an additional member to be elected by and from among the Parties to the Kyoto Protocol. This applies mutatis mutandis to the SBSTA exercising its functions with regard to matters concerning the Paris Agreement.

5. *Action:* The SBSTA will be invited to elect its Vice-Chair and Rapporteur.

(c) Organization of the work of the session

6. SBSTA 61 will be held in parallel with SBI 61. Information on the organization of the session can be found in the annotations to the provisional agenda for COP 29⁴ and will be made available on the session web page.⁵ The Chairs of the subsidiary bodies will issue, under their own responsibility, a joint note in advance of SB 61 that will suggest an approach to the work and include guidance on working efficiently, effectively and transparently during the sessions.

(d) Mandated events⁶

7. The following events are mandated to take place in conjunction with SBSTA or SB 61.

(i) *Earth Information Day 2024*

8. Earth Information Day 2024 will take place under the guidance of the SBSTA Chair on the basis of submissions received from Parties and relevant organizations on possible themes for and ways to organize the Day.⁷

9. The 17th Nairobi work programme Focal Point Forum will take place during COP 29 in conjunction with SBSTA 61.⁸

10. In addition, as requested at SBSTA 58, an event on monitoring, evaluation and learning systems for adaptation action and support, including transformational adaptation, will be held.⁹

(iii) *Event on the 2024 review of the Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts*

11. SB 60 requested the secretariat, under the guidance of the Chairs of the subsidiary bodies, to organize an event, to be held in conjunction with SB 61, to provide inputs to the 2024 review of the WIM through engagement of Parties and non-Party stakeholders in structured discussions taking into account the terms of reference for the review.¹⁰

(iv) *Events relating to the Local Communities and Indigenous Peoples Platform and its Facilitative Working Group*

12. COP 24 established the FWG of the LCIPP to further operationalize the Platform and facilitate the implementation of its three functions, relating to knowledge, capacity for engagement, and climate change policies and actions.¹¹

13. COP 24 decided that the FWG shall meet twice per year in conjunction with the sessions of the subsidiary bodies and the session of the COP.¹² The 12th meeting of the FWG will take place in conjunction with SBSTA 61.

14. COP 26 welcomed the workplan of the LCIPP for 2022–2024,¹³ under which the following will take place at SBSTA 61:

(a) Annual meeting under activity 1 of the workplan to expand and enhance the inclusion of traditional knowledge, knowledge of Indigenous Peoples and local knowledge systems in addressing and responding to climate change;

(b) Annual round-table dialogue under activity 3 of the workplan with the participation of the FWG, Indigenous Peoples, Indigenous educators, Parties, ministers of education, academic institutions and other potential partners to discuss curricula development and other educational materials, including guidelines on ethical and equitable use of such materials, to promote greater understanding of Indigenous knowledge and its importance in relation to assessing and responding to climate change;

(c) Multi-stakeholder dialogue under activity 7 of the workplan to advance the participation of Indigenous Peoples and local communities in designing and implementing holistic climate change policies and actions at all levels;

(d) Annual round table under activity 8 of the workplan to strengthen youth engagement and participation in intergenerational knowledge-sharing and continue or strengthen practices on the ground, as well as to contribute to climate policies and actions at the national and international level.

(v) *Technical event under the forum on the impact of the implementation of response measures*

15. COP 25, CMP 15 and CMA 2 mandated the forum on the impact of the implementation of response measures to share experience and best practices, providing specific examples related to reporting and informing on efforts to assess and analyse the

impacts of the implementation of response measures at SB 61.¹⁴ A technical event on this topic will take place at SB 61.¹⁵

- (vi) *In-session workshop, including round-table discussions, in conjunction with the 6th meeting of the Glasgow Committee on Non-market Approaches*

16. CMA 4 requested the secretariat to facilitate opportunities for Parties participating in NMAs to identify, develop and implement NMAs by organizing an in-session workshop, including plenary presentations and round-table discussions, to be held in conjunction with each meeting of the GCNMA, for exchanging information on NMAs.¹⁶

17. SBSTA 60 requested the secretariat to hold an in-session workshop, including round-table discussions, in conjunction with GCNMA 6 with a focus on:¹⁷

- (a) Sharing information on NMAs submitted to the NMA Platform;¹⁸

(b) Inviting interested Parties, relevant bodies, representatives of institutional arrangements and processes under the Convention and the Paris Agreement related to, inter alia, mitigation, adaptation, finance, technology development and transfer, and capacity-building, including United Nations bodies, multilateral, bilateral and other public donors, and private and non-governmental organizations, to provide information on financial, technology and capacity-building support available or provided for identifying, developing or implementing NMAs for recording on the NMA Platform.

- (vii) *Information event on progress in the development of the reporting tools under the enhanced transparency framework*

18. CMA 3 requested the secretariat to inform the SBSTA on progress in the development of the tools for the electronic reporting of the common reporting tables and common tabular formats under the enhanced transparency framework at SBSTA 57 and at each subsequent session until the tools have been finalized.¹⁹

19. On 28 June 2024, the secretariat made available to Parties the final version of the tools.²⁰ An information event thereon will take place at SBSTA 61.

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- (viii) *Information event on progress in the development of the training programme for technical review experts of biennial transparency reports, including progress in the development of the training course referred to in decision 9/CMA.4*

20. CMA 3 requested the secretariat to report to the SBSTA on progress in the development of the training programme for technical experts participating in the technical expert review of biennial transparency reports at SBSTA 57 and at each subsequent session until the development of the training programme has been completed.²¹ An information event thereon will take place at SBSTA 61.

21. CMA 4 requested the secretariat to report on progress in developing the training course, as part of the training programme outlined in annex VII to decision [5/CMA.3](#), for experts participating in the review of the information reported pursuant to chapter IV of the annex to decision [18/CMA.1](#) as part of the technical expert review pursuant to chapter VII of

the annex to decision [18/CMA.1](#) at SBSTA 58 and at each subsequent session until the development of the training course has been completed.²² An information event thereon will take place at SBSTA 61.

3. Matters relating to the global stocktake: procedural and logistical elements of the overall global stocktake process*

22. *Background:* CMA 5 welcomed the conclusion of the first global stocktake²³ and recalled the decision taken at CMA 1 to consider refining the procedural and logistical elements of the overall global stocktake process on the basis of experience from the first global stocktake.²⁴ CMA 5 decided that such consideration shall commence at SB 60 and conclude at CMA 6.²⁵

23. SB 60 commenced and advanced consideration of refining the procedural and logistical elements of the overall global stocktake process on the basis of experience gained from the first global stocktake.²⁶ SB 60 took note of the informal note²⁷ prepared by the co-facilitators for the agenda items at those sessions, noting that the informal note does not represent consensus among Parties.²⁸

24. *Action:* The SBSTA and the SBI will be invited to continue consideration of this matter, taking into account the informal note referred to in paragraph 23 above, with a view to CMA 6 concluding the consideration of the matter.

4. Research and systematic observation

25. *Background:* During the second sessional period of each year, the SBSTA focuses its consideration on systematic observation.²⁹

26. SBSTA 45 invited the secretariat of the Global Climate Observing System and the World Meteorological Organization to provide relevant updates at sessions of the SBSTA,³⁰ and SBSTA 47 invited the Committee on Earth Observation Satellites and the Coordination Group for Meteorological Satellites to report on progress at sessions of the SBSTA, as appropriate.³¹

27. *Action:* The SBSTA will be invited to consider this matter and the updates referred to in paragraph 26 above with a view to determining further action, as appropriate.

5. Matters relating to adaptation

(a) Matters relating to the global goal on adaptation*

28. *Background:* CMA 5 requested SB 60 to initiate consideration of matters relating to the global goal on adaptation.³² At SB 60, Parties initiated consideration of the matters and agreed to continue consideration of views focusing, inter alia, on matters related to paragraph 38(a–e) of decision [2/CMA.5](#) at SB 61.³³

29. SB 60 invited Parties to submit views on matters related to paragraph 38 of decision [2/CMA.5](#) by no later than six weeks prior to SB 61;³⁴ and also invited Parties and non-Party stakeholders to submit information on existing indicators for measuring progress towards the targets referred to in paragraphs 9–10 of decision [2/CMA.5](#) in use at the local, national, regional and global level.³⁵

30. SB 60 requested the Chairs of the subsidiary bodies to prepare a compilation and mapping of existing indicators relevant to measuring progress towards the targets referred to in paragraphs 9–10 of decision [2/CMA.5](#), and to convene technical experts to assist in the technical work under the United Arab Emirates–Belém work programme on indicators for measuring progress achieved towards the targets referred to above.³⁶

31. SB 60 also requested the Chairs to organize a hybrid workshop for Parties and the technical experts referred to in paragraph 30 above, following the completion of the mapping referred to in the same paragraph and prior to CMA 6; and further requested the secretariat to publish the refined mapping of indicators as part of a report on the workshop prior to CMA 6.³⁷

32. At SB 60, Parties agreed to consider or to continue consideration of matters relating to the United Arab Emirates–Belém work programme at SB 61.³⁸

33. *Action:* The SBSTA and the SBI will be invited to continue consideration of these matters with a view to providing recommendations thereon for consideration and adoption at CMA 6³⁹ or 7⁴⁰ at the latest.

(b) Report of the Adaptation Committee*^{on}

34. *Background:* COP 17 requested the AC to report annually to the COP through the subsidiary bodies,⁴¹ and CMA 1 decided that the AC shall serve the Paris Agreement.⁴²

35. *Action:* The SBSTA and the SBI will be invited to consider the report of the AC for 2024 with a view to recommending draft decisions on this matter for consideration and adoption at COP 29 and CMA 6.

(c) Review of the progress, effectiveness and performance of the Adaptation Committee*

36. *Background:* COP 27 was to review the progress, effectiveness and performance of the AC,⁴³ and COP 26 invited CMA 4 to participate in the review as it relates to the Paris Agreement.⁴⁴

37. COP 27 and CMA 4 noted that consideration of the review could not be completed at those sessions and would therefore continue at SB 58.⁴⁵ At SB 58, Parties continued consideration of this matter and agreed to continue consideration thereof at SB 59 on the basis of the draft text elements⁴⁶ prepared by the co-facilitators for the agenda items at SB 58, as amended by Parties and groups of Parties.⁴⁷

38. SB 59 could not conclude consideration of this matter.⁴⁸ At SB 60, Parties agreed to continue consideration of the matter at SB 61.⁴⁹

39. *Action:* The SBSTA and the SBI will be invited to continue consideration of this matter with a view to recommending draft decisions thereon for consideration and adoption at COP 29 and CMA 6.

6. Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts

(a) Joint annual report of the Executive Committee of the Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts and the Santiago network for averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage associated with the adverse effects of climate change*

40. *Background:* COP 19 and 20 requested the WIM Executive Committee to report annually to the COP through the subsidiary bodies and to make recommendations, as appropriate.⁵⁰

41. CMA 4 decided that the secretariat of the Santiago network for averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage associated with the adverse effects of climate change will prepare an annual report and submit it to its Advisory Board for consideration and approval. The approved report will be forwarded to the secretariat to be included in a joint annual report of the Santiago network and the WIM Executive Committee submitted to the governing body or bodies through their subsidiary bodies.⁵¹

42. CMA 5 requested the Advisory Board to develop its draft rules of procedure with a view to recommending them, through SB 61, for consideration and adoption by the governing body or bodies at the session(s) to be held in November 2024.⁵²

43. *Action:* The SBSTA and the SBI will be invited to consider the 2024 joint annual report of the Executive Committee and the Santiago network, including the draft rules of procedure referred to in paragraph 42 above, with a view to recommending a draft decision on this matter for consideration by the appropriate body or bodies.

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(b) 2024 review of the Warsaw International Mechanism for Loss and Damage associated with Climate Change Impacts*

44. *Background:* COP 22 recommended that future reviews of the WIM consider, inter alia, progress in the implementation of the workplan of the WIM Executive Committee as well as the long-term vision that guides how the WIM may be enhanced and strengthened, as appropriate.⁵³

45. CMA 2 recommended that a review of the WIM be held in 2024 and every five years thereafter, with the subsidiary bodies developing terms of reference for each review at their sessions immediately before the sessions at which they will undertake a review.⁵⁴

46. SB 60 finalized the terms of reference for the 2024 review of the WIM and agreed that the review will take place at SB 61 on the basis of those terms of reference.⁵⁵

47. SB 60 invited Parties and non-Party stakeholders to submit by 30 September 2024, in order to serve as input to the 2024 review of the WIM, inter alia:⁵⁶

(a) Views on strengths, weaknesses, gaps, challenges and opportunities related to enhancing the effectiveness and efficiency of the WIM;

(b) Views on the use and usefulness of the outputs of the WIM and the usefulness of activities under the WIM;

(c) Views on improvements of the WIM and the implementation of its functions;

(d) Other inputs on how the WIM can promote the implementation of approaches to averting, minimizing and addressing loss and damage associated with climate change impacts.

48. SB 60 requested the secretariat to prepare a summary of the views referred to in paragraph 47 above to serve as input to the 2024 review of the WIM, and to prepare a background paper to inform the 2024 review of the WIM, with the paper to include information on the status of work, activities and outputs under the WIM.⁵⁷

49. *Action:* The SBSTA and the SBI will be invited to undertake the review referred to in paragraph 46 above and to forward the outcomes to the appropriate governing body or bodies for consideration.

7. Sharm el-Sheikh mitigation ambition and implementation work programme*

50. *Background:* CMA 3 established a work programme for urgently scaling up mitigation ambition and implementation in this critical decade.⁵⁸

51. CMA 5 requested the subsidiary bodies to consider progress in implementing the Sharm el-Sheikh mitigation ambition and implementation work programme at each of their sessions from SB 60 to 65.⁵⁹ At SB 60, Parties could not conclude consideration of this matter.⁶⁰ In accordance with rules 10(c) and 16 of the draft rules of procedure being applied, the matter has been included in the provisional agendas for SB 61.

52. CMA 4 decided that at least two global dialogues shall be held each year as part of the work programme, with one to be held prior to the first regular sessions of the subsidiary bodies of the year, starting at SB 58, and one prior to the second regular sessions of the subsidiary bodies, starting at SB 59.⁶¹ It requested the secretariat to organize investment-focused events on the margins of those dialogues.⁶² The co-chairs of the work programme decided that the dialogues in 2024 will focus on the topic of “Cities: buildings and urban systems”.

53. The third global dialogue and investment-focused event were held prior to SB 60. The secretariat will prepare, under the guidance of the co-chairs of the work programme, a report on the dialogue and investment-focused event that reflects the discussions in a comprehensive and balanced manner and includes a summary, key findings, opportunities and barriers relevant to the topic.

54. The fourth global dialogue and investment-focused event will be held in Sharm el-Sheikh on 4 and 5 October 2024 respectively, after which the secretariat will prepare a report on the dialogue and event and an annual report comprising a compilation of the reports on the third and fourth dialogues and investment-focused events for consideration at SB 61 and CMA 6.

55. *Action:* The SBSTA and the SBI will be invited to continue consideration of this matter, taking into account the annual report referred to in paragraph 54 above, with a view to recommending a draft decision on the matter for consideration and adoption at CMA 6.

8. United Arab Emirates just transition work programme*

56. *Background:* CMA 4 established a work programme on just transition for discussion of pathways to achieving the goals of the Paris Agreement outlined in Article 2, paragraph 1, in the context of Article 2, paragraph 2.⁶³

57. CMA 5 decided on the elements of the work programme and that implementation thereof should start immediately after that session. It also decided that the subsidiary bodies shall guide the implementation of the work programme through a joint contact group to be convened at each of their sessions, starting at SB 60, with a view to them recommending a draft decision on this matter for consideration and adoption by the CMA at each of its sessions.⁶⁴

58. SB 60 considered matters relating to the implementation of the United Arab Emirates just transition work programme and it was agreed to continue consideration thereof at SB 61 taking note of the informal note prepared by the co-chairs for the agenda items at SB 60 under their own responsibility,⁶⁵ the exchanges of views and inputs by Parties under the agenda items at those sessions, views to be submitted no later than four weeks prior to SB 61 and the annual summary report on the dialogues.⁶⁶

59. *Action:* The SBSTA and the SBI will be invited to continue consideration of this matter with a view to recommending a draft decision thereon for consideration and adoption at CMA 6.

9. Matters relating to the forum on the impact of the implementation of response measures serving the Convention, the Kyoto Protocol and the Paris Agreement*

60. *Background:* COP 25, CMP 15 and CMA 2 adopted the workplan of the forum and its KCI.⁶⁷

61. COP 28, CMP 18 and CMA 5 adopted the updated functions, work programme and modalities of the forum and its KCI⁶⁸ and requested the forum and its KCI to implement the activities arising from the outcomes of their midterm review.⁶⁹

62. COP 28, CMP 18 and CMA 5 also requested the secretariat to organize a two-day global dialogue on the impacts of the implementation of response measures in conjunction with intersessional meetings of the KCI in 2024–2025, in collaboration with relevant organizations and stakeholders and acknowledging the work carried out by the KCI.⁷⁰

63. The first global dialogue will be held in Accra, Ghana, from 9 to 10 September 2024, with the 11th meeting of the KCI to take place in Accra from 11 to 13 September 2024, after which the secretariat will prepare a summary report capturing the discussions held at the dialogue.⁷¹

64. COP 28, CMP 18 and CMA 5 requested the KCI to propose updates to its rules of procedure for the forum to consider and make recommendations to the subsidiary bodies with a view to the subsidiary bodies providing recommendations for consideration and adoption at COP 29, CMP 19 and CMA 6.⁷²

65. The forum will consider the annual report of the KCI⁷³ with a view to making recommendations for consideration at COP 29, CMP 19 and CMA 6.

66. COP 28, CMP 18 and CMA 5 decided that the forum shall develop and recommend a five-year workplan in line with its functions, work programme and modalities, taking into

account relevant policy issues of concern to Parties, for consideration and adoption at SB 61.⁷⁴

67. SB 60 initiated the development of the five-year workplan of the forum and its KCI and it was agreed to continue work on this matter at SB 61⁷⁵ taking into account the non-paper⁷⁶ prepared by the co-chairs of the contact group on the agenda items at SB 60.

68. *Action:* The SBSTA and the SBI will be invited to convene the forum with a view to recommending a draft decision on these matters for consideration and adoption at COP 29, CMP 19 and CMA 6.

10. Sharm el-Sheikh joint work on implementation of climate action on agriculture and food security*

69. *Background:* COP 27 decided to establish the Sharm el-Sheikh joint work on implementation of climate action on agriculture and food security.⁷⁷

70. SB 60 agreed on a substantive road map for the Sharm el-Sheikh joint work on implementation of climate action on agriculture and food security, with a range of activities to be undertaken by the secretariat, including developing the Sharm el-Sheikh online portal for sharing information on projects, initiatives and policies for increasing opportunities for implementation of climate action to address issues related to agriculture and food security and presenting it at SB 61.⁷⁸

71. *Action:* The SBSTA and the SBI will be invited to continue consideration of this matter with a view to determining next steps.

75. *Background:* SBSTA 60 requested the secretariat to contact the CDM project participants that have not paid their share of proceeds to request them to confirm their intention to pay, and to report on the responses received to the SBSTA.⁸²

76. 81. SBSTA 60 took note of the draft text prepared for the agenda sub-item at that session,⁸⁷ noting that it does not represent consensus among Parties, and it was agreed to hold an intersessional workshop and to continue consideration of that text at SBSTA 61.⁸⁸

84. CMA 4 decided to elaborate the processes referred to in paragraph 7(b–g) of decision [3/CMA.3](#) on the basis of the rules, modalities and procedures⁹⁰ and adopted the rules of procedure of the Supervisory Body for the Article 6, paragraph 4, mechanism, including recommendations for adoption at CMA 5 and 6, and invited Parties and observer organizations to submit views on these matters and requested the secretariat to prepare a synthesis report on the submissions for consideration at SBSTA 58.⁹¹

85. SBSTA 58 requested the SBSTA Chair to prepare an informal document,⁹² on the basis of relevant views expressed by Parties at that session, on the outcomes of the technical expert dialogue on the matters referred to in paragraph 9 of decision [7/CMA.4](#) and relevant submissions, for consideration at SBSTA 59 with a view to it recommending a draft decision on further guidance on the rules, modalities and procedures for consideration and adoption at CMA 5.⁹³

86. CMA 5 requested SBSTA 60 to continue consideration of relevant matters mandated in decision [7/CMA.4](#) with a view to recommending a draft decision thereon for consideration and adoption at CMA 6.⁹⁴

87. SBSTA 60 took note of the draft text prepared for the agenda sub-item at that session,⁹⁵ noting that it does not represent consensus among Parties, and it was agreed to hold an intersessional workshop and to continue consideration of that text at SBSTA 61.⁹⁶

88. *Action:* The SBSTA will be invited to continue consideration of these matters with a view to recommending a draft decision thereon for consideration and adoption at CMA 6.

- (c) Work programme under the framework for non-market approaches referred to in Article 6, paragraph 8, of the Paris Agreement and in decision 4/CMA.3

89. *Background:* The GCNMA is convened by the SBSTA Chair and meets in conjunction with the first and second regular sessions of the SBSTA each year.⁹⁷ GCNMA 6 will take place in conjunction with SBSTA 61.

90. CMA 5 requested the secretariat to complete the development of the UNFCCC web-based platform for NMAs⁹⁸ and fully operationalize it as soon as possible and no later than GCNMA 5; to notify the UNFCCC national focal points for Article 6, paragraph 8, of the Paris Agreement, where identified, of the deployment of the fully operational web-based platform; and to develop and update, as necessary, a manual on the process for submitting and recording information on NMAs on the web-based platform.⁹⁹

91. SBSTA 60 convened GCNMA 5 and welcomed the operationalization of the NMA Platform referred to in paragraph 90 above.¹⁰⁰

92. CMA 5 requested the secretariat to organize an in-session workshop, including round-table discussions,¹⁰¹ to be held in conjunction with GCNMA 5, and to prepare a report on the workshop, including on the joint mitigation and adaptation approaches referred to in Article 5, paragraph 2, of the Paris Agreement, and other activities and approaches.¹⁰²

93. SBSTA 60 noted paragraph 4 of decision [8/CMA.4](#), in which GCNMA 6 was requested to undertake an expedited and simple assessment of the progress and outcomes of the first phase of implementing the activities of the work programme under the framework for NMAs referred to in Article 6, paragraph 8, of the Paris Agreement, and invited Parties and observers to submit views and information on the progress and outcomes of the first phase of implementing the work programme activities, and views on improving and recommending the schedule for implementing the work programme activities for the second phase.¹⁰³

94. *Action:* The SBSTA will be invited to convene GCNMA 6 with a view to continuing to implement the work programme activities, and to determine further action, as appropriate.
